I am a resident of Mooresville, NC on Lake Norman. I currently serve on the Board of Directors of the Catawba Riverkeeper Foundation (CRF) and served for several years recently as the Board Chairperson. CRF is submitting its own comments; these are my own.

For the bulk of my career I was on the corporate headquarters staff of Northeast Utilities, so I am not your typical anti-utility environmentalist and I brought that balanced perspective to CRF. I've always felt that Duke Energy was a well-run company and have never given a second thought to the fact that our house is less than 6 miles from Duke's McGuire Nuclear Power Plant.

But we do have to wonder why Duke would advocate leaving its unlined, ground/surface water-polluting coal ash dump at its Marshall coal-burning plant on the banks of Lake Norman. True, they propose capping it with an impermeable layer that would theoretically prevent water from leaching toxic chemicals from the coal ash into nearby waters. That's a risky proposition particularly given the use of Lake Norman and numerous points downstream on the Catawba River and its impoundments for drinking water, including the City of Charlotte.

Let's not forget that it wasn't that long ago that Duke experienced a major fiasco at its Dan River coal-burning plant. There the collapse of a 48" drain pipe underneath the coal ash dump resulted in 39,000 tons of coal ash and 27 million gallons of polluted ash pond water flowing into the Dan River. This was the third largest coal ash incident in the US and resulted in fines and restitution of \$102 million after Duke pled guilty to nine charges of criminal negligence under the Federal Clean Water Act, the largest federal criminal fine in North Carolina history.

So, Duke has a less than stellar track record dealing with coal ash.

Duke is already required to remove its coal ash at eight other sites in North Carolina and all of its sites in South Carolina. Yet, over the course of recent months Duke has suggested that its so-called cap-in-place solution at Marshall would alleviate the need to overcrowd Rt. 150 and other roads with a never-ending caravan of dump truck loads of coal ash headed to a proper geologic location and a modern engineered landfill. I suspect that nearby residents would much prefer to endure the traffic inconvenience than continuing water pollution from coal ash at Marshall or, worse yet, another Dan River fiasco. By the way why not move the coal ash out the same way the coal comes in...by rail?

Incidentally, Duke prides itself on recycling coal ash at other sites into environmentally harmless cementitious building products. Shouldn't at least partial recycling of coal ash at Marshall be pursued?

It's pretty clear why Duke wants to cap-in-place at Marshall...because it's the least costly option. That might be good for Duke ratepayers and shareholders, but not for the protection of water resources of the many communities around Lake Norman and downstream, including Charlotte drinking water customers.

If Duke doesn't offer to do the right thing the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) should require Duke to either recycle or remove its coal ash from its leaking, unlined dumps on the banks of Lake Norman and move it to dry lined properly engineered storage at a suitable geologic location isolated from irreplaceable ground/surface water resources.

Dear Cliffside Closure Hearing Comments NC DEQ,

I have been swimming, canoeing, and fishing the Broad River for 30 years. The gently flowing waters are cool and clear, and moss covered rocks in the shallows are like a lush carpet under bare feet on a hot summer's afternoon. The section of river between Cliffside and the Broad River Greenway in Boiling Springs is exceptionally wide and scenic, and smallmouth fishing along this stretch is some of the best in the Southeast. Thousands of swimmers, waders, anglers and paddlers enjoy the waters of the Broad River.

However, nearby coal ash ponds are putting these traditions at risk by polluting the Broad River with toxic heavy metals like arsenic and cobalt. On January 22, our community will have a chance to speak out about this pollution and urge the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to enforce a full cleanup of the coal ash. I'll be there, and I hope you will be too.

In 2011, I founded the Broad River Paddle Club in an effort to connect people interested in recreation on the water. In 2015, we formed the Broad River Alliance, a Waterkeeper Affiliate and program of MountainTrue, to continue efforts that not only promote the Broad River but protect it as well. Knowing that our love of fishing, swimming, and paddling relies on the river being uncontaminated, one of our main actions has been to push Duke Energy for a thorough cleanup of its coal ash waste in Cliffside.

The two remaining ash basins in Cliffside contain over 6 million tons of coal ash. The ash is sitting dozens of feet below the groundwater table, and Duke Energy's own reports show that toxins are leaking from the ash basins into our groundwater and surface water (streams and the Broad River). Last spring, a group of students from Appalachian State University came to the Broad River, and by collecting and analyzing fish tissue, they found that fish around the Cliffside facility have higher and potentially dangerous levels of contamination compared to the fish upstream. Just three months ago, Duke Energy measured exceedances of federal groundwater protection standards for arsenic and cobalt at Cliffside. That seems pretty risky to me.

DEQ should require Duke Energy to remove its coal ash from these leaking, unlined pits and move it to dry lined storage away from our waterways and out of our groundwater. There is already dry lined storage in place at the Cliffside facility. However, Duke Energy plans to leave its coal ash sitting in the groundwater at Cliffside, where it will keep polluting our groundwater and river forever.

The community has come out time after time over the last several years, making clear that we're concerned about pollution from Duke Energy's coal ash and want Duke Energy to completely excavate and safely store this toxic waste. It is long past time for DEQ and Duke Energy to listen. Duke Energy is already required to remove its coal ash at eight other sites in North Carolina and all of its sites in South Carolina—our families and our community deserve the same consideration and protections.

I moved to North Caroline in 2014 from Tennessee, where I witnessed the immediate aftermath of the largest coal ash disaster in the United States in late 2008. As a researcher, I spent a lot of time speaking with residents and workers impacted by the Tennessee Valley Authority spill. Had the disaster occurred during the day time, it could have been deadly for residents and the agency had opportunities to prevent the disaster prior to the spill by moving the ash to a lined, dry landfill, but the agency chose to cheapest route to address previous problems in the impoundment. In the long-run, the disaster cost much more than it would have cost of convert the impoundment to a lined landfill. The costs were not just felt by TVA, but by the community, especially those who were displaced, those who experienced devalued property, and those who fear the long-term health outcomes. DEQ and Duke Energy have the opportunity to make the right decision for everyone and to prevent future disasters, spills and leaks. **DEQ should require Duke Energy to remove its coal ash from its leaking, unlined impoundments and move it to dry lined storage.** This is what the community wants and it is the best choice for people, the environment, and water systems.

We have lived in Rutherford County for 45 years. Bill was born and raised in West Virginia coal country and has witnessed first-hand how communities are damaged and even destroyed by companies that ignore the environmental damage of coal. Nancy grew up in Eden, N.C. just 3 miles from the coal ash spill in the Dan River. We attended the Coal Ash Basin Closure meeting at Chase High School on January 22. At that meeting a show of hands unanimously demonstrated support for the option of complete excavation and removal of all coal ash Duke Energy's Rogers station to a lined landfill. This letter is written in strong support of the Cliffside Community's right to clean water and a healthy environment, as well as the right of all those living and drinking water downriver from the Rogers Station.

Because clean water is an essential resource for <u>all</u> people, the standard of environmental justice needs to be applied to closure options for coal ash disposal. NCDEQ has a policy that states, "North Carolinians having fair treatment and meaningful involvement with respect to the development, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws, regulation, and policies." NCDEQ also has a newly formed 16-member <u>Environmental Justice and Advisory Board</u> whose preamble states that, ". . .all people in North Carolina should have access to clean air, clean water, clean soil and the opportunity to live in safe and healthy communities."

DEQ's new mission states that, "Providing science based environmental stewardship for the health and prosperity of all North Carolinians can only be accomplished if fighting for Environmental Justice is part of every DEQ activity."

- Because environmental justice means the right of all people to live free from environmental threats,
- Because coal ash that poisons our water is a known, present, and future environmental danger,
- Because when environmental threats are identified, those accountable for creating the threats should be held accountable,
- Because Duke Energy created this threat by locating coal ash pits in close

proximity to major water sources and because they did this over decades to minimize their costs of dealing with the ash in an environmentally responsible manner,

• Because the states of South Carolina and Virginia have mandated excavation and removal of coal ash from <u>all</u> coal-fired power plants, there is no justification for differential treatment for six Duke Energy coal ash sites in our state,

• And because the Environmental Justice standard is simple— THOSE WHO CREATE THE PROBLEM SHOULD FULLY BEAR THE RESPONSIBILITY TO CLEAN IT UP!

Therefore, we urge NCDEQ to mandate that Lyn Goode, Duke CEO, and Duke's Board of Directors meet their full responsibility to remove all the ash away from all water sources at the company's expense and without passing any of the costs to rate payers. Duke Energy is the largest investor owned utility company in the U.S. and has the financial resources and technical ability to eliminate the coal ash threat to water. Do not allow Duke Energy's cost estimates of coal ash removal to outweigh community health. There is no justification for Duke Energy's low-risk classification of the coal ash dump at Rogers Steam Station. Capping toxic coal ash and monitoring the cap for thirty years as Duke Energy proposes is a dangerous and disingenuous solution based on greed and scientific folly.

Therefore, it is imperative that NCDEQ apply the standard of Environmental Justice consistent with its own mission and require Duke Energy to remove all coal ash AWAY from all water sources and store it in a scientifically designed manner and at a location that prevents future poisoning of our North Carolina citizens. Any action other than this allows coal ash to remain a source of poison to our water forever.

On a personal note, our otherwise very healthy daughter developed a rare neuroendocrine cancer at the age of 35. Although the cause of her cancer cannot be known, we do know that the environment is being bombarded by endocrine disruptors, which are the by-products of industrial processes and pollution. There can be no substitute for clean water and clean air and all efforts to achieve this end protect your families and ours.

Excavation would add only nine more trucks on community roads each day, compared to 13 more trucks on community roads for the duration of the cap-in-place scenario.

• It is past time for DEQ to listen to the community—not Duke Energy's consultants— about what our community needs. We need Duke to clean up its coal ash and stop the water pollution.

To the decision makers at NC DEQ:

Please accept the following written comments from Clean Water for North Carolina (CWFNC) on the proposed coal combustion residual impoundment closure options for the ash basin located in Rutherford and Cleveland Counties, NC at Duke Energy's Rogers Energy Complex. CWFNC is a nonprofit organization that has been working with NC communities for clean water and environmental justice for more than 30 years. We have members from across the state including Rutherford and Cleveland Counties.

Duke Energy's proposed impoundment closure options for the coal ash basin at the Rogers Energy Complex site (formerly Cliffside Steam Station) do not appropriately capture risks to groundwater, surface water, the surrounding and downstream communities, and the environment. Any coal ash sitting in an unlined basin at Rogers Energy Complex (REC) should be completely excavated and moved to the onsite landfill, considering information from the community, and our review of Duke Energy's Comprehensive Site Assessments and Corrective Action Plans, surface impoundment reports, and closure options.

Comments on community impacts:

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According to Duke Energy's own Emergency Action Plan, all unlined basins at Cliffside have a current high hazard potential, meaning if failure occurred impacts to communities' safety could be disastrous.

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In the event of a breach due to dam failure or storm, Duke's flood inundation maps show 70 structures could be inundated. However, the same document acknowledges no population at risk.

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Cliffside's dams have a history of deficiency notices for many of the same problems

that caused the Dan River Spill. Impoundment Inspection Reports have previously described leaching and cracking at most pipe joints, small and large animal burrows in embankments, and soil erosion and liquefaction. Furthermore, historic rain events have been responsible for many coal ash related spills and landfill breaches at Cliffside which puts the community at great risk.

The stigma of polluted groundwater could compromise property values for generations.

Demographically, the residents near the Rogers Energy Complex are particularly vulnerable as compared to state averages. Important information to consider about the area within a ½ mile radius of the active ash basin:

Average per capita income is \$18,000

47% Low-income population

0

17% population with less than a high school diploma

Due to the vulnerabilities of residents in this area, special care must be taken to fully characterize the many risks they face. Full excavation is the only closure option possible for DEQ to fulfill their mission to protect communities across NC. **Comments on Groundwater:**

The active basin at Cliffside should be fully excavated based on the risks for groundwater safety

•

The active coal ash basin at the Rogers Energy Complex violates federal CCR rules with coal ash sitting below the groundwater level.

•

Duke recently reported groundwater exceedances for cobalt and arsenic. Arsenic is colorless, odorless, tasteless and toxic to human life - a known carcinogen. Cobalt is associated with cardiovascular health effects. In 2013, Duke discharged over 21,000 pounds of cobalt at Rogers Energy Complex. Cobalt has historically been the most common contaminant at high levels found on private wells in the surrounding community.

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The polluted groundwater from the basins flows into the Broad River and Suck Creek, which are drinking water sources for Shelby NC, Gaffney SC, and other downstream

municipalities.

There is not enough evidence and independent oversight to support Duke's claim that nearby well water pollution is not coming from the coal ash impoundments. DEQ must conduct an independent analysis that identifies the safest closure option for the long-term protection of water supplies.

Duke University research indicates that "closure" by cap in place does not protect groundwater and could instead increase the leaching of deadly arsenic due to a lack of oxygen exposure following the "capping" procedure. If capped in place Duke Energy will be required to monitor the basin for only 30 years while leaving the ash to leach into surrounding water supplies indefinitely.

Experts at Duke Energy's 2016 Disposal Forum shared insight highlighting how significant rainwater infiltration will continue at unlined capped sites. DEQ must take this into account given the increase

in historical rainfall events due to climate change and the record for 2018 as the wettest year in the history of NC.

Comments on Coal Ash cleanup leadership

Governor Cooper run a campaign promising environmental and community protection from coal ash, but has yet to act on this issue. Neighboring states are moving forward to protect their communities from Coal ash:

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South Carolina has required its coal-powered utilities, including Duke, to clean up all unlined coal ash basins in the state. Follow-up testing conducted before and after SC coal ash cleanups has shown decreases in contamination at the site by over 95% for toxic metals like arsenic.

In Virginia, there is strong support for a bipartisan bill that will require Dominion Energy to completely excavate all of its unlined basins in the state. Dominion Energy has reportedly announced that it supports the proposal to remove coal ash from unlined ponds across Virginia.

Given promises made by Governor Cooper during his campaign, and the recent decisions from South Carolina and Virginia to fully remove coal ash, DEQ should not allow NC's coal ash to be permanently left behind to pollute groundwater and surface water across the state of NC for generations to come.

Comments regarding costs for different closure options:

The Cliffside Closure Options Evaluation Report is misleading. It states that closure by removal is almost double the cost of cap in place, yet within the report, a cost analysis table with the post-closure maintenance cost, shows that closure by removal is just over \$40 million more than the price to leave the ash in place. See the table below:



\$40 million is a small amount for Duke Energy given its annual operating revenue of over \$22 billion and knowing that they paid its CEO over \$21 million last year, a 55% increase from the previous year.

None of the estimates include the cost of remediation for pollution that has already happened and violations that will continue in the future. Nor does it account for the expenses incurred by the community members themselves if their health is affected.

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Cost of cleanup shouldn't outweigh community health nor is it the responsibility of DEQ to consider costs to ratepayer as this is the duty of the Utilities Commission.

Comments on Duke's data analysis and reporting

Data and reporting provided by Duke Energy have repeatedly been shown to be flawed and misleading:

- DEQ's own January 2016 report acknowledges data gaps that point to a mischaracterization – unintentional or intentional - of the influence of contamination from the active ash basin on the water supply wells.
- There are not enough monitoring wells east of the active ash basin, and the deep layer of groundwater moving through fractured bedrock has not been sufficiently studied by DEQ and Duke.

DEQ's report acknowledges "data gaps related to groundwater uncertainty include incomplete capture zone modeling in fractured bedrock for up-gradient and side-gradient supply wells in the immediate vicinity of the impoundments."

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An independent review of the Allen Steam Station Comprehensive Site Assessment identified multiple reporting and scientific errors and illustrated how the Comprehensive Site Assessment authors selected only the data that supported the desired conclusion (groundwater from the coal ash basins is not influencing private wells).

These include:

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"Cherrypicking" to include only 9 of 45 shallow monitoring wells reported in the groundwater flow tables in the CSA, when inclusion of all 45 wells' data would have given a clearer picture of groundwater flow and direction

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Failing to identify all the potential wells in the vicinity that could serve as 'sinks' in the groundwater model, thus shifting the direction of groundwater flow;

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Basing modeling of groundwater flow only on overly simplistic hydraulic gradient calculations.

In the absence of an outside review source on coal ash management, DEQ should seek independent experts for an objective review of all Duke's generated reports and closure options plans for all sites. Given these data gaps and the toxicity of the contaminants with groundwater exceedances next to these ash basins, including arsenic and cobalt, there is NO excuse to leave the coal ash in the unlined basin by capping in place or consolidating the ash for a hybrid cap option.

Conclusion

For these reasons, we know that any coal ash stored in unlined basins at the Rogers Energy Complex presents a real and urgent risk to groundwater, surface water, and local safety, and should be fully excavated.

The Cliffside community has come out time after time over the last several years, making their concerns clear about pollution from Duke Energy's coal ash and they want Duke Energy to get its coal ash out of its unlined, leaking pits. It is past time for DEQ to listen to the community—not Duke Energy's consultants— about what the community needs. We need Duke to clean up its coal ash and stop the water pollution.

As NC marks the 5th anniversary of the Dan River coal ash catastrophe, the third largest coal ash spill in US history, we ask of DEQ to stop allowing Duke to put communities at risk and clean up the coal ash disaster they created. Full excavation is the safest closure option for the nearby communities and the only option that fulfills DEQ's mission.

As a former environmental scientist for the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, I am compelled to provide my observation: Duke has not provided reasonable assurance that the Marshall and Allen coal ash ponds will be in compliance with federal and state environmental laws.

To be clear, it is impossible for anyone to provide any reasonable assurance that a hazardous waste storage site will be in compliance when: (1) the site is already out of compliance and (2) cannot be corrected without the complete excavation, installation of proper lining, and construction of containment infrastructure. We know that coal ash and derivative contaminants AR in the groundwater table at both the Marshall Steam Station and the Allen Steam Station. Duke has stipulated to those facts, as well.

Consider that if the coal ash is excavated, in order to construct an appropriately lined storage reservoir, a new permit application (not modification) would normally be required and fair and equal standards applied. As part of that application, the riverside and lakeside locations would probably not be selected for a new facility under today's siting rules.

Indeed, it appears that Duke has been given preferential treatment, evidenced by the arbitrary procedural measures taken to reclassify its ash ponds as reduced risk. The risk reduction was not granted because of changed physical conditions on-site. Rather, the risk was reduced simply because Duke asked for a favorable reassessment. A different standard was applied. Reviewers appear to have tailored their assessment in order to reclassify the sites because the potential risk of the sites has only increased due to the increased amount of material and aging of the facilities. This counterintuitive risk assessment and decision-making process satisfies the (normally difficult to illustrate) "arbitrary and capricious" standard required to revoke a permit.

I also expect that other facilities have not been granted the option to cap hazardous waste inplace when it was actively contaminating groundwater, wetlands, and surface waters-particularly drinking water supplies. Although no site is equal, North Carolina residents and businesses require an equal application of the law. The mere fact that a cap-in-place option was extended to Duke illustrates unfair and improper application of administrative rules and procedures.

From a permitting or compliance administrator's perspective, it will be a nightmare address ongoing, chronic violations at these sites as hydrological and geological processes continue. Leaving the waste at these locations indefinitely requires an unacceptable amounts of government hand holding and babysitting. I don't think the State of North Carolina is prepared to assume the role of adoptive parents of two problem children.

For decades, Duke has abdicated its responsibility to better dispose of and recycle its coal ash. It is time that Duke assumes the responsibility.

It is also time that NCDEQ stops deferring to Duke. NCDEQ has the staff and the expertise. So, deference to information provided by Duke contractors at public meetings is an insult to the talented scientists, engineers, and technicians working for the state of North Carolina.

North Carolina's coal ash dumps and ponds must to be cleaned up and DEQ should only allow complete encapsulation for the new ash storage facilities. The existing dumps should be carefully excavated to minimize airborne particulates and moved away from rivers and flood plains to fully lined sites on Duke Energy's property.

Cap-in-place is unacceptable for **any** of the coal ash sites in North Carolina. Any "solutions" proposed by Duke Energy that do not excavate and move ash to fully lined, scientifically designed systems that fully encapsulate coal ash must be rejected. Without multiple, sealed bottom, side, and top liners, North Carolina's groundwater will always be at risk. Due to increases in extreme weather, more frequent hurricanes and massive rainstorms, groundwater models of 100 or 500-year floodplain are obsolete. Given the unpredictable fluctuations in the water tables and groundwater flows, there is no way that surface capping without properly engineered underlying bottom liners can protect groundwater in the coming decades.

Unlike Duke Energy's new lined landfill at Brickhaven in Chatham County, the construction of all new lined landfills should be scientifically engineered to protect groundwater in every way possible. Duke Energy's has a long history of widespread groundwater and surface water contamination, and criminal violations of the clean water act. Because of these repeated and gross violations that created health problems and drinking water contamination throughout the state, DEQ should require Duke Energy's new landfills to go beyond the minimal mandatory protections provided by current regulations. DEQ must carry out independent studies and obtain recommendations for the best liner technologies, redundant liners, and with multiple long-term safeguards. Scientifically based placements for baseline and ongoing groundwater monitoring wells should be established. These must be thoroughly and constantly monitored – with full, public, transparent, internet accessible, easily available data from the monitoring results.

Ground water and surface monitoring should be ongoing for a minimum of 50 years. This monitoring should be funded by Duke Energy, but carried out by independent, qualified field technicians and laboratories.

During excavation, construction, and filling of the landfills, all worker safety measures should be taken to prevent a repeat of the serious harms to worker health from the cleanup crews that worked on the TVA spill in Kingston, Tennessee. Again, unlike Brickhaven, worker safety, proper fitting and testing of N95, or better, particulate masks should be required for everyone that works in or around the coal ash, or that operates bulldozers, dump trucks, or heavy equipment that transport the ash. Wherever needed, full protective suits should be provided to workers. Regularly scheduled OSHA inspections, as well as unannounced and unscheduled OSHA inspections should be part of the clean-up and construction permits until all exposed ash is fully covered at each site.

While transporting existing coal ash dumps away from rivers and floodplains is essential, every effort should be taken by DEQ to ensure that the distances coal ash is moved is minimized and that the coal ash destinations are always kept on Duke Energy's property.

Once constructed, these new lined landfills should represent the best technologies and materials available – not materials that create short-term financial savings. The original existing dumps were disasters for public health, for NC communities, and for our state's waters. We have this one chance to remediate some of the damages and most importantly, to safeguard future generations from heavy metal coal ash contamination. Our state-wide redesign of storage systems for millions of tons of coal ash must be done right this time.

No coal ash sites, no coal ash communities should be considered low-risk, and all deserve full protection. Gross environmental justice violations have been committed by the past handling of coal ash placements and coal ash processing practices. Now, DEQ must protect all communities. The NC Department of Environmental Quality must ensure that none of these communities, which have experienced many decades of harm, are given less than full protections. No cap-in-place permits should be allowed.

We learned yesterday that – as soon as the Feb. 15 comment deadline for the closure options evaluations had passed -- Duke Energy submitted an additional report that purports to estimate greenhouse gas emissions associated with the various closure options for its six unresolved coal ash sites in North Carolina.

We will submit a detailed response to this report shortly.

However, NCDEQ should disregard this submission because it was made after the department's deadline for Duke to submit its materials and outside the public comment period, denying the public an opportunity to respond to it. NCDEQ should also disregard this submission because it is irrelevant to the decision facing NCDEQ, which is to select a closure method that stops the ongoing pollution and continuing threat to our water resources posed by Duke Energy's leaking coal ash basins. Duke Energy operates coal-burning generating units at each of these facilities that emit huge amounts of greenhouse gases, and NCDEQ would lose all credibility if it allowed Duke Energy to leave the toxic residuals from burning coal in leaking pits forever because of Duke Energy's supposed concern for greenhouse gas emissions.

Nor should NCDEQ and the Cooper Administration delay their decision as a result of Duke Energy's gamesmanship. NCDEQ already knows that Duke Energy's cap in place and hybrid closure plans would leave millions of tons of coal ash saturated in groundwater, where they will continue to leach toxic pollutants into public waters for decades to come, and where they will continue to pose a risk of catastrophic failure. And it knows that tens of thousands of North Carolinians have called on the agency to protect our waters by removing the ash from the unlined lagoons and placing it into dry, lined storage or recycling for concrete, as is being done in South Carolina and Virginia.
