



Authorities

Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act (1899)

Protection of the Nations navigable waters

Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (1972)

To restore and maintain the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of the Nations waters.



Authorities – Section 10 (33 U.S.C. 401, et seq.)

Section 10 Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899

- Regulates activities that affect course, location, and navigable capacity
- Prohibits unauthorized obstruction or alteration of any navigable water of U.S.
- All work (dredging, docks, pilings, marinas, fill, etc)
- Authorizes the Secretary of the Army to issue permits in navigable waters

Authorities-Section 10

 Geographic jurisdiction includes all navigable waters of the U.S. defined (33 CFR Part 329) as "those waters that are subject to the ebb and flow of the tide and/or are presently used, or have been used in the past, or may be susceptible to use to transport interstate or foreign commerce."



Geographical definition cont...

Jurisdiction extends shoreward to the high tide line in tidal waters or the ordinary high-water mark in non-tidal waters and waterward to 3 nautical miles.







Section 404, Clean Water Act

- Regulates all waters of the United States, including wetlands, for the discharge of dredged and/or fill material; including mechanized land clearing
- Authorizes the Secretary of the Army to issue permits for the discharge of dredged or fill material.

DEFINITION OF WETLANDS 33 CFR 328.3(b)

"The term 'wetlands' means those areas that are inundated or saturated by surface or ground water at a frequency and duration sufficient to support, and that under normal circumstances do support, a prevalence of vegetation typically adapted for life in saturated soil conditions. Wetlands generally include swamps, marshes, bogs and similar areas."



Functions of Creeks, Streams, & Wetlands

- Water storage and flood control
- Sediment & pollutant removal
- Clean water for human consumption
- Wildlife habitat
- Food chain support
- Food production

- Storm surge protection
- Silviculture (Logging)
- Aesthetics
- Educational purposes
- Recreational Activitiescanoeing, fishing, hunting, bird watching...





Permitting

The Corps, in making permit decisions, must consider a range of factors including environmental impacts, socioeconomic impacts and property ownership rights, and balance public benefits against public detriments.





Permitting

Types of Department of the Army Permits

- 1. Regional General: restricted to activities authorized within a specific state; generally did not have a notification requirement.
- 2. <u>Nationwide General:</u> for commonly recurring activities across the entire United States; activities with minimal adverse impacts, most have notification requirements.
- 3. <u>Individual (Standard:</u> for activities not eligible for Regional or Nationwide General Permits.



PERMIT EVALUATION

Section 404(b)(1) Guideline Sequencing

- Avoidance of wetlands
- Minimizing impacts on wetlands
- Compensatory mitigation for unavoidable impacts



Enforcement

When an individual discharges dredged or fill material in waters of the US (or does any work in navigable waters) without a permit, the Corps has authority to require remedial action, including restoration.
