She later interned at the Rachel Carson Reserve while studying coastal environmental management at the Duke Marine Lab to investigate the role of bulkheads on salt marsh loss.



Sam is now a Community Planner for Eastern Carolina Council (ECC), where she applies her academic and professional background in coastal science, policy,

management, and outreach to aid communities throughout Eastern N.C. with disaster recovery, hazard mitigation planning, stormwater management, land use planning, GIS analysis/mapping, grant administration, and education.

In addition to her role at ECC, Sam promotes public awareness and single-use plastic reduction as the Crystal Coast and Outer Banks Global Ambassador for Plastic Ocean Project; volunteers for the North Carolina Coastal Federation with cleanups and wetland restoration; and sits on the Town of Beaufort Stormwater Advisory Committee and the N.C. American Planning Association Chapter's Resiliency Committee.
