The City of Durham continued to collect and accept solid waste, recycling and yard waste during the Covid-19 outbreak and limited acceptance of certain materials in the months of April. and May. We also changed the yard waste collection collections in April and May to one collection per month and in June we started by-weekly collection. All plans are to start back a weekly collection once the collections operation is able to do so safely. This "collections pause" is why the WD&RC saw a significant lower inbound tonnage of yard waste.

* In #48-B the number of days open for the HHW was lower than normal due to the Covid-19 closing in April and May.
