

Rescue + Recovery Efforts

FEDERAL ASSISTANCE

- •2,000 FEMA workers setup 24 Disaster Recovery Centers in North Carolina. Provided \$231 MM in housing assistance for 131K+ households as of Nov 13th.
- 1,500 National Guard Troops assisting with structural repairs and rescues (765 people).
- •US Army Corps of Engineers working with all levels of government to assess damages, remove debris, and repair water systems.



"I have lived on the East Coast of North Carolina my entire life and have seen quite a few hurricanes. I have never seen water come with such speed and destruction as with this storm."






Division of Energy, Mineral, and Land Resources Dam Safety

LOCAL ASSISTANCE

More than 1,600 responders from 39 state and local agencies have performed 146 missions supporting the response and recovery efforts through the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC).



Legislation

- House Bill 149 allocating state funding for initial storm recovery and to ensure voter security (signed)
- •Senate Bill 382 to authorize delayed plan submittals and to extend the deadline for expiring plan approvals (pending)



Pre-Storm Preparation

- Ensure emergency spillways on basins and traps are fully functional. Secure any loose filter fabric, rock, or liners.
- Clean out culverts, outfalls, inlets, ditches, or other conveyances as needed to prevent clogging. Ensure outfalls are stabilized per your approved plan.
- Catch basins or curb inlets with inserts used to filter sediment from the storm drain system can be temporarily removed to prevent street flooding.

Pre-Storm Preparation

- Secure any construction materials that may become airborne during the storm.
- Haul away waste materials; identify permitted waste facilities or landfills and approved temporary disaster debris storage sites.
- Seal and secure or otherwise protect containers holding equipment fluids, liquid building material waste, flocculants, herbicides, or other hazardous or toxic wastes from leaks or spills.

Post-Storm Actions

- Do not touch any downed powerlines or equipment in contact with powerlines.
- Avoid driving or working in flooded areas or nonworkable soils. Be on the lookout for washed-out or undermined roads. Avoid bodily contact with floodwaters.
- Check and record rain gauges.

Post-Storm Actions

- Clean up off-site sedimentation immediately.
- Remove debris from culverts, outfalls, ditches, etc. on the project, and evaluate for stability.
 Make necessary repairs. Debris should be hauled to existing permitted disposal facility or to a pre-approved temporary disaster debris storage site.
- Repair any damaged erosion and sediment control measures to restore their full functionality in accordance with the plan.

Portal Terminology

- Permit plan approval
- Location or Environmental Interest DEQ-wide general term referring to a facility, site, project, etc. at a specific location that is related to a permit, certificate, plan approval, etc.
- Responsible Official individual who has (signature)
 authority to act on behalf of a new Location (project site)
- **Preparer** individual with access to the Location to prepare applications on behalf of the Responsible Official or his/her delegate

Cross-Media Electronic Reporting Rule

Title 40 CFR Part 3

(CROMERR) Compliant Signatures

- 1. The identified signatory is to be uniquely entitled to sign the document using an uncompromised electronic signature device, and
- 2. the signatory is an individual who is authorized to sign the document by virtue of his or her legal status and his or her relationship to the regulated entity on whose behalf the signature is executed.

Lesson 5: Defining "Valid Electronic Signatures"

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So what makes a valid electronic signature?

A valid electronic signature on an <u>electronic document</u> is one that is created with an electronic signature device that is:

- Uniquely entitled to a signatory
- Not compromised
- · Used by a signatory who is authorized to sign the electronic document

About Project Names

Craft them carefully....

Project names (aka *Environmental Interests* or *Locations*) are used for subsequent permits or certificates throughout the DEQ.

Keep broad enough to cover multiple activities or permits, but specific enough to uniquely identify the regulated entity or scope of work.

Not easily changed once created.
