1.0 Purpose

This procedure defines the framework for - preparing for and responding to - environmental emergencies and accidents at the <COMPANY NAME> facility.

2.0 Scope

This procedure applies to operations of <COMPANY NAME> that have related environmental aspects.

For the purpose of this procedure, a potential emergency situation or accident is one that that could result in an environmental impact and require emergency response (spills, etc).

3.0 Responsibilities

The Emergency Response Coordinator (ERC) is responsible for the overall process of identifying potential environmental emergencies situations and potential accidents – as well as for - planning for response, prevention and mitigation of the environmental impacts. Human Resources Department is responsible for conducting drills and maintaining records.

5.0 Procedure

- 5.1 The EMST shall meet at least annually to establish & update the list of potential emergency situations and potential accidents. These can be documented either in the table below or on Form EF-09A. For each potential emergency, the associated environmental impacts will be identified. Notes from these meetings maybe taken using for EF-06B. The list of Emergencies will be documented in the table in this procedure.
- 5.2 For each potential Environmental Emergency, a corresponding "Emergency Response Plan" will also be listed. Emergency Response Plans will include at least the following information:

Table 1. Potential Emergencies at <COMPANY NAME>. EXAMPLE <re-do according to your specific potential emergencies>

#	Potential Environmental Incidents & Emergencies	Description & Potential Impact	Are Emergency Response Plans Needed?	Emergency Plan to be Used
1	Fire (building, paints, solvents, fuels, people	Air Pollution, Water Pollution from Fire Fighting, Depleting Resources through rebuilding	Y	EAP
2	Natural Gas Leaks	Air Pollution, Air Pollution from fire, Global Warming, Explosions and Fires causing injury and possible death.	Y	EAP
3	Chemical Spills (55-gal drums of thinner, acetone, oils, diesel, gasoline,	Ground water pollution	Y	ERP
4	Propane Tank Leaks	Air Pollution, Explosions or Fires	Y	ERP
5	Welding Gas Leaks / Ruptures (argon, acetylene, oxygen, CO2, N2, He,	Air Pollution, Fires and Explosions	Y	ERP
6	Nitrogen Tank Rupture	Air Pollution, Respiratory Hazard,	Y	ERP
7	Natural Disaster (hurricane, floods, ice storm)	Air Pollution from tank rupture, ground water pollution from flooding, ice takes power lines down- electrocution hazard,	Y	EAP

EAP = Emergency Action Plan (as required by OSHA 29 CFR 1910.38

ERP = Emergency Response Plan (as required by OSHA HazWoper - 29 CFR 1910.120q)

- 5.5 Emergency Response Plans listed in the above Table will be maintained by the <COMPANY NAME> ERC
- 5.6 Environmental emergency methods and communications will be tested at least annually during either a drill or real emergency. The results will be documented using form EF-09B, EF-09C, or other form. Copies of these test records will be kept in the <COMPANY NAME> ERC's office.

These results can be documented on Form EF-09D, Post-Accident Checklist. If deficiencies are observed, corrective/preventive actions will be identified and undertaken by implementing EP-012.
