




















Emergency Planning Community Right-to-Know Act EPCRA







EPCRA Major Provisions

301 – 303 Emergency Planning
304 Emergency Release Notification
311 – 312 Hazardous Chemical Storage Reporting
313 Toxic Chemical Release Reporting







Emergency Planning

- Requires State Emergency Response Commission
- Formation of Local Emergency Planning Committees
 - Emergency Response Plans for each community







Emergency Release Notifications

 Requires facilities to make an IMMEDIATE notification of any unintentional hazardous substance release







Chemical Storage Reporting

- Requires facilities to report chemicals above threshold
 - Extremely Hazardous Substances EHS
 - Hazardous Substances
 - Provide a Safety Data Sheet SDS
 - NC follows the federal guidelines and collects a fee







Toxic Chemical Release

- Better known as TRI or Form R
- Must be permitted annually with NC Department of Environmental Quality
 - Due by July 1st each year to EPA, no NC fee







Tier II Funds

- \$1.2M in receipts annually
- \$347K 6 full time employees
- \$120K E-Plan and online payments
 - \$100K LEPC Grants
- \$772K NC Regional Response Team Program







NC Regional Response Teams

- 7 RRTs in the State
- 1,787 Local Missions
- 63 Outreach Missions
 - 2 Tech Advice
 - 45 State Missions







Local Emergency Planning Committee

- 99 Counties and 1 Tribal Emergency Planning
 Committee
 - Requirements to become an active LEPC
 - Strengths and Success in our LEPCs
