Due to the increase in the public using our convenience sites, we have been overrun with increased amounts of trash and recycled materials. We had back-up cans to allow materials to be hauled over the weekends, stored at the landfill yard and emptied on Mondays so our sites could function on the weekends. We have placed these cans permanently at sites now because of the demand. We have also reinstated both glass and mixed paper (which had been eliminated from our sites) and the public has rewarded us with increased usage (a good problem). With more folks at home, we are seeing increased usage, more need for additional hauling and a lack of empty 40 yard containers. Our staff is running weekends as well as working all week.

Editor notes (SS): electronics tons are much lower than last year. Nan says they work with Goodwill for computer equip and 9.4 tons TVs is the only data they have.
