There have been no major changes. We have seen increased volumes of waste with the stay at home orders.

CA: Spoke to a representative at the High Point MRF on 10/27. High Point received 13,623.79 tons of material in FY2019-20 at the MRF. 10,000.48 tons of that figure was marketable material; the rest was contamination. In addition to the recyclables collected from the city of High Point, the MRF also takes material from the city's business district and from commercial accounts. I removed the 9638.84 tons of non-municipal material provided in city's original submission, leaving curbside, Other, and total tonnage columns that are similar to FY2018-19.

High Point does not separate out TV tonnages from their total electronics received - CA, 10/27 phone call. Some electronics go to Guilford Co., some they process themselves. Need better info about this next year.
