Decades of mismanagement have left many of our fisheries in worse shape than when stricter regulations started being implemented. It is time to think about trying other options that would benefit everyone and the resource. Hatcheries and habitat enhancements are proven management tools that focus on improving fisheries rather than restricting the public's freedom to access them. Wise use of these tools can create more seafood and recreational opportunity while generating new revenue.
