I am a resident of Mooresville, NC on Lake Norman. I currently serve on the Board of Directors of the Catawba Riverkeeper Foundation (CRF) and served for several years recently as the Board Chairperson. CRF is submitting its own comments; these are my own.

For the bulk of my career I was on the corporate headquarters staff of Northeast Utilities, so I am not your typical anti-utility environmentalist and I brought that balanced perspective to CRF. I've always felt that Duke Energy was a well-run company and have never given a second thought to the fact that our house is less than 6 miles from Duke's McGuire Nuclear Power Plant.

But we do have to wonder why Duke would advocate leaving its unlined, ground/surface water-polluting coal ash dump at its Marshall coal-burning plant on the banks of Lake Norman. True, they propose capping it with an impermeable layer that would theoretically prevent water from leaching toxic chemicals from the coal ash into nearby waters. That's a risky proposition particularly given the use of Lake Norman and numerous points downstream on the Catawba River and its impoundments for drinking water, including the City of Charlotte.

Let's not forget that it wasn't that long ago that Duke experienced a major fiasco at its Dan River coal-burning plant. There the collapse of a 48" drain pipe underneath the coal ash dump resulted in 39,000 tons of coal ash and 27 million gallons of polluted ash pond water flowing into the Dan River. This was the third largest coal ash incident in the US and resulted in fines and restitution of \$102 million after Duke pled guilty to nine charges of criminal negligence under the Federal Clean Water Act, the largest federal criminal fine in North Carolina history.

So, Duke has a less than stellar track record dealing with coal ash.

Duke is already required to remove its coal ash at eight other sites in North Carolina and all of its sites in South Carolina. Yet, over the course of recent months Duke has suggested that its so-called cap-in-place solution at Marshall would alleviate the need to overcrowd Rt. 150 and other roads with a never-ending caravan of dump truck loads of coal ash headed to a proper geologic location and a modern engineered landfill. I suspect that nearby residents would much prefer to endure the traffic inconvenience than continuing water pollution from coal ash at Marshall or, worse yet, another Dan River fiasco. By the way why not move the coal ash out the same way the coal comes in...by rail?

Incidentally, Duke prides itself on recycling coal ash at other sites into environmentally harmless cementitious building products. Shouldn't at least partial recycling of coal ash at Marshall be pursued?

It's pretty clear why Duke wants to cap-in-place at Marshall...because it's the least costly option. That might be good for Duke ratepayers and shareholders, but not for the protection of water resources of the many communities around Lake Norman and downstream, including Charlotte drinking water customers.

If Duke doesn't offer to do the right thing the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) should require Duke to either recycle or remove its coal ash from its leaking, unlined dumps on the banks of Lake Norman and move it to dry lined properly engineered storage at a suitable geologic location isolated from irreplaceable ground/surface water resources.

Virginia has just published news of a bipartisan bill to excavate all 28 million tons of toxic coal ash Dominion Energy currently stores in the Chesapeake Bay watershed. The ash either will be recycled into cement or concrete, or moved to a dry, lined landfill. Dominion has been storing its toxic ash for decades in unlined pits that are leaking pollutants into the groundwater and nearby waterways, including the James, Potomac, and Elizabeth rivers. This is not unlike Duke Energy's mess in North Carolina where our citizens are suffering from toxic exposure and will suffer fro decades to come.

On Thursday, January 24 Virginia Governor Ralph Northam, the Speaker of the Virginia House of Delegates Kirk Cox, a bipartisan group of legislators, and Dominion announced their agreement on this legislation to clean up coal ash in Virginia. With broad bipartisan support and with Dominion's backing, it is hopped that the bill quickly moves through the General Assembly and is signed into law in the coming weeks. It passed out of its first subcommittee the same day as the announcement.

If this makes sense in Virginia, it should make perfect sense in North Carolina also.

Dear Shelia:

I wanted to thank you for coming to Belews Creek for the DEQ Hearing on January 10th. We have anticipated this meeting for a long time. Now that it is behind us along with many of the additional state hearings, I am sure that you are exhausted, as I would be. I hope that you are able to take a break after Belmont next week.

With Belews Creek being the first site, we had numerous conversations about how to deal with the original format of the informational meeting. They were actually heated arguments about how we wanted to approach this format, which we believed diminished and divided the voices of the community. Ultimately it was important to our members that we treat your staff with kindness and dignity. Our fear was that if we took over the room and demanded to be heard that we would immediately lose your trust and shut down any opportunity for what we ultimately want: to have a complete excavation of the unlined landfill. This is nine years of my personal work and at least five years for many others after forty years of living with this monster in our community.

While we lead with love at Belews Creek, we know that is not the case at all of the sites. And ultimately their force got them what we wanted - a chance to speak out to the community. We hope that our desires are not overlooked because we made this conscious decision. As one organizer commented, it will be interesting to see if kindness will serve you.

I felt very good about our personal conversation that we had with the photographs on my iPad. I thought that my prep work allowed me to share with you many of my gravest concerns. I appreciate your visible concern and the direction that you gave to me to find out how the community feels about the landfill. We are working primarily on doing that through hosting numerous events during the period between now and February 15th. We are collecting signatures to petitions, comments, photographs and audio for you. We intend to give it to you in a format that is easy for your staff to review.

I primarily spoke with your communications staff and the the person at the landfill table. I did not visit the other tables. However when speaking with others, they are clearly upset and distraught about how the meeting was handled. They felt that the DEQ reps were not able to answer their questions and sent them to another person. In the end, none of their questions were answered. One community member called it a "shell game." We have decided to hold another meeting on February 2nd, the five-year anniversary of the Dan River Spill. We are hoping to have an opportunity for questions to be answered and more comments to be collected.

I hope that some of your members were able to attend the press conference to hear our

concerns. I have attached a link to the press from the press conference here. <u>https://theliliesproject.org/final-closure-plans</u>

I also shared with you that I envision Stokes County as being the model for coal ash remediation and transition to renewables. When I think about the other coal ash impacted communities, I do not foresee them moving forward with this same charge that we feel called to in Walnut Cove. Through my grant we are working on visioning workshops and planning events so that we can move forward on many of these opportunities that are out of sheer necessity for the issues facing us regarding climate change. We see this in a wide range of opportunities, including coal ash encapsulation, a hub for concrete industry, renewable housing, solar farms and more.

Attached is a vision board that I created as part of our January meeting. We have received numerous press in national and international sources. I hope that your department will work with us to fulfill Governor Cooper's commitment to addressing climate change. We are very excited about what is in store in a post-excavation era of the coal ash at Belews Creek. I am very eager to get started on next steps and feel optimistic that this is the right time for you to decide to excavate all of North Carolina's coal ash, even if it requires a longer time frame than defined by law. Our communities are willing to accept the extra time associated with excavation. Plus I saw a report from a 3rd party contractor that said that the time frame for capping in place and excavation were both twelve years. My gut tells me that it will take way less time and cost less than anticipated. Especially when you consider the 25% contingency fees, that Belews already has a landfill available to accept ash, and over half of the acreage is way shallower than expected. These are all very good signs that this entire process is going to unfold surprisingly in our favor because it is the right thing to do. It is time to go ahead and finish the job of excavating the ash into the new landfill or the one that already exists.

I will be sure to send you a narrated version of the photos I shared with you about the community members we lost just since late December and the specific points I am concerned about as presented in Duke's proposal.

Had the disaster occurred during the day time, it could have been deadly for residents and the agency had opportunities to prevent the disaster prior to the spill by moving the ash to a lined, dry landfill, but the agency chose to cheapest route to address previous problems in the impoundment. In the long-run, the disaster cost much more than it would have cost of convert the impoundment to a lined landfill. The costs were not just felt by TVA, but by the community, especially those who were displaced, those who experienced devalued property, and those who fear the long-term health outcomes. DEQ and Duke Energy have the opportunity to make the right decision for everyone and to prevent future disasters, spills and leaks. **DEQ should require Duke Energy to remove its coal ash from its leaking, unlined impoundments and move it to dry lined storage.** This is what the community wants and it is the best choice for people, the environment, and water systems.

Although I am now merely a private citizen concerned about coal ash storage, as a previous staff member at Clean Water for North Carolina, I spent many years researching coal ash contamination. I know the threats that unlined ash basins can pose to public health and environmental quality, even when the water is drained and the basin is capped in place. I urge you not to allow capping in place of ash at this or any other site in North Carolina.

One aspect that concerns me is that the toxic metals and other compounds associated with coal ash would still be present without any liner after the basin is drained, and could therefore still leach into the nearby aquifer, affecting well water and surface water nearby. Please consider conducting your own independent analysis that identifies the safest closure option for the long-term protection of water supplies. This decision is so important for the health of the communities near this coal ash site, so I hope you will consider it carefully.

The Rest of My Comments

I have included a report from NCSU written for the Cement Industry to study the demand for coal ash in this area after Duke stated that there was no market for their ash. The reality is it is not the best financial incentive for their shareholders. The same article stated that over 180 ideas had been submitted to Duke, but none of them were able to meet industrial demand. Perhaps their unwillingness is related to having a state government run by your former employees.

After discussing regulation and his unawareness of the health risks, I told one of the cement guys about a dry landfill of ash on a family farm directly across from Raylen Vineyards in Davie County. He agreed that was a bad idea. He said, "Oh yeah, you don't want that stuff laying around."

Doing nothing is an affront to the civil rights issue. We have seen precedent set where doing nothing has in fact resulted in significant health issues where people claimed that wasn't any problem. The time to act is now. We are open and ready.

I am concerned that Duke's proposal notes that it intends to only monitor Boron at Belews Creek, even though in October it admitted to five exceedances of heavy metals, stated below.

Duke Energy's Notice of Groundwater Protection Standards Exceedene for Belews Creek Steam Station on October 15th, 2018 includes: Arsenic Beryllium Cobalt Lithium Radium 226 and 228 combined

A known arsenic plume off of Old Plantation Road resulted in Dee Dee Duncanson having the highest arsenic level in the entire state of North Carolina at 108, when the state standard is at 10. However because of the arbitrary nature of the black box boundary line shown below, she did not receive bottled water nor any water filtration system from Duke Energy. She lives just outside of the .5 mile radius.


On the other side of the coal ash basin, lives Andree Davis. She faces the large black pipes to discharge the 14 billion gallons of water running across the street from her home. She inherited the home and moved to the land from Myrtle Beach, while her immediate family lives in Indiana. She has no way to leave the nightmare. Her body is covered in sores from arsenic poisoning. These sores and her home is visible in the following short film.

Why would Duke select Boron when these other five contaminants are known problems? Boron is a known substance in coal ash, but a simple Google search shares the answer. Boron in almost all circumstances is a health benefit, unlike the other five contaminants. By cherry-picking which elements to monitor, Duke is avoiding the obvious admission of guilt. Duke will continue to pollute our local environment forever without full excavation from the groundwater table, the free-flowing streams the landfill is built upon, and the drains that sit beneath the ash basin and flow indiscriminately in numerous directions throughout the community. They are not monitored beyond the square box identified by Duke as the problem area. (seen below)





A May 5, 2016 article describes the dramatic reduction in pollution into the air at Belews Creek. However without proper protection in the current storage solution or the proposed hybrid solution, the community will continue to bear the inhumane suffering as the result of cancer and rare diseases. Once the community had shifted to the scrubbers that I began noticing a dramatic shift in deaths. **Numerous people were dying within a month of receiving a cancer diagnosis.** It was as if the coal ash had become super toxic. The following numbers explain why. Avner Vengosh had also released data confirming these results in 2012, when I first reached out to him to find a group to support us at Belews Creek. He put me in touch with Earthjustice, who put me in touch with Appalachian Voices. The rest is history and the outpouring in support for Belews Creek through media and concern from a wide range of professionals continues to grow.

The Belews Creek plant alone — Duke's largest power plant in the Carolinas and among those where nearby residents have complained about unusual patterns of illnesses — released over 600,000 pounds of toxic chemicals to the air in 2014, including 250 pounds of arsenic, 380 pounds of chromium, and 230 pounds of lead. It reported dumping another 132,000 pounds of toxic chemicals into impoundments and almost 19,000 pounds into Belews Lake that year.

Then consider how much pollution the plant has dumped into the environment since it began operating in 1974. Looking just at the decade from from 2005 through 2014, the Belews Creek plant self-reported emitting over 48 million

pounds of toxic chemicals to the air, over 135,000 pounds to surface waters, and over 2.2 million pounds to impoundments.

During that decade, the amount of pollution that plant and others emits to the air dropped dramatically after North Carolina's Clean Smokestacks Act, adopted in 2002, was implemented. For example the Belews Creek plant emitted 15 million pounds of toxic chemicals to the air in 2005 compared to just about 600,000 pounds a decade letter — a 96 percent decrease.

But as more pollutants are caught in smokestack scrubbers, they are being disposed of instead in impoundments and landfills at the power plant sites. Because these existing disposal facilities are unlined, they put potent toxins in contact with groundwater.

Monitoring near the coal ash impoundments at the Belews Creek plant has found levels of heavy metals in groundwater that exceed state standards. For example, chromium was found at levels that exceeds state standards by 50 percent, and most of the chromium in coal ash is of the particularly **toxic and cancer-causing hexavalent form**.

So is it surprising that people living near these plants report unusual patterns of illness? And are these alleged disease clusters mere happenstance, as North Carolina officials want the public to believe? Adams of Appalachian Voices doesn't think so.

I found a disturbing discovery today in a letter written by SELC that is signed by numerous environmental groups, including Interfaith Power & Light. I received this letter after hearing Susannah Tuttle speak at Tuesday's public comment period at the NC DEQ EJ Advisory Board in Wilmington. Susannah stated that she represents 1.5 million congregants in North Carolina and just happened to be in Wilmington with representatives of 50 congregations. Their primary concerns were coal ash and Gen X.

In this letter, it states that the Belews Creek coal ash basin is classified as mine reclamation. This is a stunning revelation to me. At what point was there ever a mine located on this facility. When they were building the original construction of the basin, it was purposefully built on top of local streams, just like all of the other ash basins around the state. There was an assured water supply to maintain an outdated storage solution. But we know now that this technology far exceeds the good with disastrous harm. The hybrid landfill will never be dried out. The ash will never be removed from the groundwater. Even Duke's report states that the hybrid solution is the only one of the three that lists a con as stabilization. This is a serious, serious problem. Stokes and Rockingham Counties will never recover from catastrophic failure, which would far exceed the neat failure of coal ash directly into the Dan River, where the river's nature disguised the disaster. A failure at Belews Creek would far surpass that of the TVA spill, a risk that justifies any cost. This sentiment is echoed throughout our community, especially those living in harm's way.

Assistant Secretary Holman assured me that decisions were being made based on the needs of the community, not the law. So I trust that these technicalities will not fall under the negligence of protection associated with mine reclamation. But what is ongoing evidence of environmental

injustice and a tremendous burden of health problems. DEQ's regulatory authority could put an end to this nightmare for once and for all. Please require Duke Energy to fully and carefully excavate the ash at Belews Creek and the other remaining sites. The traffic, timing and costs are inconsequential to the long-term needs of the community.

As a former environmental scientist for the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, I am compelled to provide my observation: Duke has not provided reasonable assurance that the Marshall and Allen coal ash ponds will be in compliance with federal and state environmental laws.

To be clear, it is impossible for anyone to provide any reasonable assurance that a hazardous waste storage site will be in compliance when: (1) the site is already out of compliance and (2) cannot be corrected without the complete excavation, installation of proper lining, and construction of containment infrastructure. We know that coal ash and derivative contaminants AR in the groundwater table at both the Marshall Steam Station and the Allen Steam Station. Duke has stipulated to those facts, as well.

Consider that if the coal ash is excavated, in order to construct an appropriately lined storage reservoir, a new permit application (not modification) would normally be required and fair and equal standards applied. As part of that application, the riverside and lakeside locations would probably not be selected for a new facility under today's siting rules.

Indeed, it appears that Duke has been given preferential treatment, evidenced by the arbitrary procedural measures taken to reclassify its ash ponds as reduced risk. The risk reduction was not granted because of changed physical conditions on-site. Rather, the risk was reduced simply because Duke asked for a favorable reassessment. A different standard was applied. Reviewers appear to have tailored their assessment in order to reclassify the sites because the potential risk of the sites has only increased due to the increased amount of material and aging of the facilities. This counterintuitive risk assessment and decision-making process satisfies the (normally difficult to illustrate) "arbitrary and capricious" standard required to revoke a permit.

I also expect that other facilities have not been granted the option to cap hazardous waste inplace when it was actively contaminating groundwater, wetlands, and surface waters-particularly drinking water supplies. Although no site is equal, North Carolina residents and businesses require an equal application of the law. The mere fact that a cap-in-place option was extended to Duke illustrates unfair and improper application of administrative rules and procedures.

From a permitting or compliance administrator's perspective, it will be a nightmare address ongoing, chronic violations at these sites as hydrological and geological processes continue. Leaving the waste at these locations indefinitely requires an unacceptable amounts of government hand holding and babysitting. I don't think the State of North Carolina is prepared to assume the role of adoptive parents of two problem children. For decades, Duke has abdicated its responsibility to better dispose of and recycle its coal ash. It is time that Duke assumes the responsibility.

It is also time that NCDEQ stops deferring to Duke. NCDEQ has the staff and the expertise. So, deference to information provided by Duke contractors at public meetings is an insult to the talented scientists, engineers, and technicians working for the state of North Carolina.

The existing dumps should be carefully excavated to minimize airborne particulates and moved away from rivers and flood plains to fully lined sites on Duke Energy's property.

Cap-in-place is unacceptable for **any** of the coal ash sites in North Carolina. Any "solutions" proposed by Duke Energy that do not excavate and move ash to fully lined, scientifically designed systems that fully encapsulate coal ash must be rejected. Without multiple, sealed bottom, side, and top liners, North Carolina's groundwater will always be at risk. Due to increases in extreme weather, more frequent hurricanes and massive rainstorms, groundwater models of 100 or 500-year floodplain are obsolete. Given the unpredictable fluctuations in the water tables and groundwater flows, there is no way that surface capping without properly engineered underlying bottom liners can protect groundwater in the coming decades.

Unlike Duke Energy's new lined landfill at Brickhaven in Chatham County, the construction of all new lined landfills should be scientifically engineered to protect groundwater in every way possible. Duke Energy's has a long history of widespread groundwater and surface water contamination, and criminal violations of the clean water act. Because of these repeated and gross violations that created health problems and drinking water contamination throughout the state, DEQ should require Duke Energy's new landfills to go beyond the minimal mandatory protections provided by current regulations. DEQ must carry out independent studies and obtain recommendations for the best liner technologies, redundant liners, and with multiple long-term safeguards. Scientifically based placements for baseline and ongoing groundwater monitoring wells should be established. These must be thoroughly and constantly monitored – with full, public, transparent, internet accessible, easily available data from the monitoring results.

Ground water and surface monitoring should be ongoing for a minimum of 50 years. This monitoring should be funded by Duke Energy, but carried out by independent, qualified field technicians and laboratories.

During excavation, construction, and filling of the landfills, all worker safety measures should be taken to prevent a repeat of the serious harms to worker health from the cleanup crews that worked on the TVA spill in Kingston, Tennessee. Again, unlike Brickhaven, worker safety, proper fitting and testing of N95, or better, particulate masks should be required for everyone that works in or around the coal ash, or that operates bulldozers, dump trucks, or heavy equipment that transport the ash. Wherever needed, full protective suits should be provided to workers. Regularly scheduled OSHA inspections, as well as unannounced and unscheduled OSHA inspections should be part of the clean-up and construction permits until all exposed ash is fully covered at each site.

While transporting existing coal ash dumps away from rivers and floodplains is essential, every effort should be taken by DEQ to ensure that the distances coal ash is moved is minimized and that the coal ash destinations are always kept on Duke Energy's property.

Once constructed, these new lined landfills should represent the best technologies and materials available – not materials that create short-term financial savings. The original existing dumps were disasters for public health, for NC communities, and for our state's waters. We have this one chance to remediate some of the damages and most importantly, to safeguard future generations from heavy metal coal ash contamination. Our state-wide redesign of storage systems for millions of tons of coal ash must be done right this time.

No coal ash sites, no coal ash communities should be considered low-risk, and all deserve full protection. Gross environmental justice violations have been committed by the past handling of coal ash placements and coal ash processing practices. Now, DEQ must protect all communities. The NC Department of Environmental Quality must ensure that none of these communities, which have experienced many decades of harm, are given less than full protections. No cap-in-place permits should be allowed.

head as she heals from stage IV Glioblastoma, RT screen. Marie Garlock (multicolor sweater) was asked to speak at the start, and hoped to honor what came together based on what Danielle told neighbors at the **community planning meeting 1/6**. Residents for Coal Ash Cleanup planned, based on her wisdoms, an "Epiphany Press Conference" to open the 1/10/2019 DEQ Event at Walnut Cove Elementary.

Danielle (1/6/19): Yes, Epiphany Sunday. DEQ must listen to us because we are telling the truth! We shine the light. Because Belews residents have faith--and me, personally? I walk in faith that someone in DEQ, someone in that department wants to treat me right! And they will! Someone in DEQ will do right by me, and us! We know there has **got** to be someone, maybe it's been in their heart a while, they just need that little push. In God's strength, I and we can **be** that push. Or maybe they're a **new** employee--or with a promotion can make that decision. Having attended the public informational meeting on closure options for Belews Creek Power Plant, Yadkin Riverkeeper would like to make the following comments regarding the various options.

1. Coal ash has demonstrated toxicity to human health, and should be treated with all due care and respect as we look for the final disposition of this material.

2. Belews Lake has colloquially been known as "Cancer Lake" for many years – while many stories are anecdotal, the public perception based on many years of experience of the families living in that area cannot be simply disregarded. Based on the current knowledge of the contaminants that leach from coal ash, these stories must be taken seriously, especially in light of the health aftereffects on unprotected workers in Tennessee.

3. While cap in place may slow the leaching process due to rainfall, it will not stop groundwater intrusion and leaching. To pursue cap in place strategies now merely kicks the problem down the line to future generations who will eventually have to address the problem properly; this burden will fall on the taxpayers of North Carolina.

4. We are disappointed on the emphasis placed on cost of the various options. With the known dangers of coal ash contamination, this emphasis attempts to place economy ahead of human health – an unacceptable compromise to North Carolinians trying to live healthy, productive, and happy lives. Additionally, prior excavations in South Carolina have demonstrated that excavation to lined pits may be less costly than the estimates currently being used.

5. After the spill on the Dan River, less than 5% of the ash was cleaned up, with no reason to believe that future clean-ups could be more successful. With a demonstrated inability to conduct an effective cleanup, it is imperative to ensure that there are no more spills.

6. Both Virginia and South Carolina have committed to excavation to lined pits based on the long-term hazards associated with coal ash. North Carolinians deserve the same level of protection.

Thank you for considering our input on the plan for closure at the Belews Creek coal ash site.

We learned yesterday that – as soon as the Feb. 15 comment deadline for the closure options evaluations had passed -- Duke Energy submitted an additional report that purports to estimate greenhouse gas emissions associated with the various closure options for its six unresolved coal ash sites in North Carolina.

We will submit a detailed response to this report shortly.

However, NCDEQ should disregard this submission because it was made after the department's deadline for Duke to submit its materials and outside the public comment period, denying the public an opportunity to respond to it. NCDEQ should also disregard this submission because it is irrelevant to the decision facing NCDEQ, which is to select a closure method that stops the ongoing pollution and continuing threat to our water resources posed by Duke Energy's leaking coal ash basins. Duke Energy operates coal-burning generating units at each of these facilities that emit huge amounts of greenhouse gases, and NCDEQ would lose all credibility if it allowed Duke Energy to leave the toxic residuals from burning coal in leaking pits forever because of Duke Energy's supposed concern for greenhouse gas emissions.

Nor should NCDEQ and the Cooper Administration delay their decision as a result of Duke Energy's gamesmanship. NCDEQ already knows that Duke Energy's cap in place and hybrid closure plans would leave millions of tons of coal ash saturated in groundwater, where they will continue to leach toxic pollutants into public waters for decades to come, and where they will continue to pose a risk of catastrophic failure. A good way to address the coal ash disposal problem and obtain a useful product in the process is:

- Extract the dominant, useful component of coal ash, FLY ash, and put it to good use
- Dispose of the remaining lesser amount of bottom ash, that is more likely to contain potentially hazardous materials, by putting it in lined basins away from water sources

Fly ash can be extracted very readily and inexpensively from the exhaust stream electrostatically. Such a process was used by a Duke predecessor, Carolina Power & Light, decades ago at its Roxboro plant. It was so successful that several wallboard plants sprang up around Roxboro to use the fly ash in gypsum for the wallboard. This was recalled at the time of the Dan River spill in 2014. Also reported at that time was Sioux City, Iowa's building two large concrete silos for storing excess fly ash in the winter for use during the summer construction period. Unfortunately, this practice of extracting and using fly ash was not followed extensively. The American Coal Ash Association (ACAA) reports that 38 million tons of fly ash along with 111 million tons of coal ash were produced in 2017. Apparently, most of the fly ash ended up in storage basins along with the coal ash.

Fly ash has become a very valuable and sought-after material. It can be used as a substitute for some of the Portland cement in concrete. It is less expensive and more environmentally friendly to produce than cement. There is a growing market for concrete with the construction boom.

Studies at NC State University show that fat, oil, and grease do not stick to walls of pipe containing fly ash like they do to concrete without fly ash. With the construction of new sewer lines and the replacement of obsolete ones, a large market for fly ash is created. The market is so large that we are importing coal ash from around the world, e.g., China and India, for the fly ash it contains.

If Duke had used this method of fly ash extraction that is employed at the Roxboro plant, North Carolina would have substantially less coal ash storage problems than it currently has. It appears obvious that this practice should be used everywhere in the country and abroad so that fly ash rather than coal ash can be shipped to the US. Unfortunately, extracting fly ash from coal ash that has been stored in basins is very difficult vis a vis doing it electrostatically from the exhaust stream.

Duke could excavate the coal ash at Belews Creek Station (which is in a low-lying area which risks water contamination) and haul it to a higher area. There are rail facilities that are used to bring coal to the plant that can be used to haul away the coal ash with less disruption to the area and lower cost to Duke than if they used trucks.
