I am a resident of Mooresville, NC on Lake Norman. I currently serve on the Board of Directors of the Catawba Riverkeeper Foundation (CRF) and served for several years recently as the Board Chairperson. CRF is submitting its own comments; these are my own.

For the bulk of my career I was on the corporate headquarters staff of Northeast Utilities, so I am not your typical anti-utility environmentalist and I brought that balanced perspective to CRF. I've always felt that Duke Energy was a well-run company and have never given a second thought to the fact that our house is less than 6 miles from Duke's McGuire Nuclear Power Plant.

But we do have to wonder why Duke would advocate leaving its unlined, ground/surface water-polluting coal ash dump at its Marshall coal-burning plant on the banks of Lake Norman. True, they propose capping it with an impermeable layer that would theoretically prevent water from leaching toxic chemicals from the coal ash into nearby waters. That's a risky proposition particularly given the use of Lake Norman and numerous points downstream on the Catawba River and its impoundments for drinking water, including the City of Charlotte.

Let's not forget that it wasn't that long ago that Duke experienced a major fiasco at its Dan River coal-burning plant. There the collapse of a 48" drain pipe underneath the coal ash dump resulted in 39,000 tons of coal ash and 27 million gallons of polluted ash pond water flowing into the Dan River. This was the third largest coal ash incident in the US and resulted in fines and restitution of \$102 million after Duke pled guilty to nine charges of criminal negligence under the Federal Clean Water Act, the largest federal criminal fine in North Carolina history.

So, Duke has a less than stellar track record dealing with coal ash.

Duke is already required to remove its coal ash at eight other sites in North Carolina and all of its sites in South Carolina. Yet, over the course of recent months Duke has suggested that its so-called cap-in-place solution at Marshall would alleviate the need to overcrowd Rt. 150 and other roads with a never-ending caravan of dump truck loads of coal ash headed to a proper geologic location and a modern engineered landfill. I suspect that nearby residents would much prefer to endure the traffic inconvenience than continuing water pollution from coal ash at Marshall or, worse yet, another Dan River fiasco. By the way why not move the coal ash out the same way the coal comes in...by rail?

Incidentally, Duke prides itself on recycling coal ash at other sites into environmentally harmless cementitious building products. Shouldn't at least partial recycling of coal ash at Marshall be pursued?

It's pretty clear why Duke wants to cap-in-place at Marshall...because it's the least costly option. That might be good for Duke ratepayers and shareholders, but not for the protection of water resources of the many communities around Lake Norman and downstream, including Charlotte drinking water customers.

If Duke doesn't offer to do the right thing the North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) should require Duke to either recycle or remove its coal ash from its leaking, unlined dumps on the banks of Lake Norman and move it to dry lined properly engineered storage at a suitable geologic location isolated from irreplaceable ground/surface water resources.

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I attended last night's meeting and have to say there was unanimous support for excavating the coal ash from the Marshall Steam Plant site.

As far as placing that coal ash in a lined landfill, I would like to know if the Marshall Steam Plant site has an adequate area for this that is a significant distance from the Lake Norman water shore if the coal ash was excavated and to be kept on site versus trucking the coal ash to an off site lined landfill.

I understand that some wooded land would need to be cleared if the lined landfill is created on site for the coal ash. This is acceptable to me as a local resident and is a better alternative than having significant increased risk for cancer from the toxic chemicals and substances contained in the coal ash.

It is not acceptable to me to have the coal ash basin just capped or a hybrid partial excavation. The ground water is already affected and subsequently this will contaminate the Lake Norman water.

I have a family history of both lung cancer and breast cancer. In the past we have gone through the expense of mitigating a house for radon in order to avoid that cancer risk.

I also have a question about removal of the coal ash from the Marshall site.

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I attended the meeting last evening at Sherrills Ford Elementary School. I expected to hear a presentation from DENR regarding the possible options for dealing with the Marshall Steam plant Coal Ash Ponds. That did not happen.

There were so many people, the planned format could not be carried out. Instead, we had to have a question and answer session. Many of the answers were essentially, "that is a good question, I will have to get back to you on that" but no one ever said how they would get back to us or how we could find the information.

The vast majority of residents were supportive of the excavate the ash pond option. We were, however, given the distinct impression that this option was not highly favored by either Duke Energy or the folks from DENR. When pressed on the issue, various DENR representatives gave a number of questionable responses.

If Duke owns all the land around the Marshall Steam Plant, and is already building land fill ash mounds on this property, why would we be told that the traffic up and down route 150 would be so heavy? There is no reason the dump trucks, once filled with fly ash, would have to leave the Duke property. All they would need to do is drive about a mile to the land fill and dump the loads. No traffic on 150 would be required.

We were also told the air quality would be adversely impacted by all the diesel trucks and excavating equipment. How is this temporary problem worse than the constant and continual problem of leaching from the ash ponds? That was never addressed.

Similarly, we were all given the distinct impression that Duke Energy was calling the shots and not the State. Even though Duke was not represented at the meeting - neither was the NC General Assembly. Only One Senator and One Representative were present. So how is the State controlling what Duke wants to do?

I saw no indication that the folks from DENR had any authority over the resolution of the Marshall Steam Plant Ash Ponds.

The Drinking Water Protection/Coal Ash Clean Up Act of 2016 Section 130A-309.214(3) outlines how and when Marshall (designated low-risk) shall be closed.

Section 130A-309.214(3)(iii) provides **AT THE ELECTION OF THE DEPARTMENT** the owner of the impoundment shall **either**...

Section 130A-309.214(3)(iii)(a) provides that the department has the option to "Close in any manner allowed pursuant to subdivision (1) of this subsection known as Section 130A-309.214(1) for High-risk impoundments.

Section 130A-309.214(1) High Risk impoundments requires excavation.

DEQ continues to quote "the law" in response to Q&A. However, the law clearly provides DEQ with the option to **EXCAVATE** Marshall which clearly is the will of the people you represent.

While excavation is mandatory for high-risk impoundments, it is an option for low-risk impoundments as well.

And don't even get me started on how the CAMA law of 2014 was revised subsequently forcing Marshall into a low-risk rating when it would have clearly been rated higher prior to the CAMA laws revision.

Ultimately the people will be footing the bill for cleanup. You clearly heard that the cost and timeline is not an overriding issue other than the belief that both have been purposefully overstated. We the people are willing to share or bear the cost if that's what it takes to excavate.

This community has come together to ensure our voices are heard and many many many more will be at the next meeting when the Marshall closure plan is presented.

We expect this closure plan to be nothing less than excavation.

  - a. Test results: Ground water contamination, air quality, site/dam stability, private well testing, etc.
  - b. Detailed analysis of closure options including the advantages and disadvantages of those options.
  - c. Discussions of options employed elsewhere and the adequacy or inadequacy of those options.
  - d. Provide statistics for cancer rates, and other health related problems for the sites surrounding Marshall vs. the general population.
2. Have a question and answer session after the presentation.

Duke wants to recover \$570M from North Carolina Customers for utility work caused by hurricanes in 2018. A typical residential customer using 1,000 Kilowatt-hours of electricity per month would see their bill increase from \$103.85 to \$104.69 according to Duke. Using that Duke estimation model, if the removal option for Marshall is \$1.14 Billion, which is 14% higher than what was mentioned in the Sherrills Ford meeting, the average cost increase would only be \$1.68 per month per customer. Surely our health is worth more than

\$1.68/month.

In summary, coal ash was supposed to be safe in unlined basins, however that was wrong. Coal ash was supposed to be safe to use as structural fill, however that was wrong. So what makes anyone think that capped in place or hybrid solutions are viable options, when past ideas approved by the DEQ failed? 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I'm a resident of Catawba county and live right down the road from the Island Point 100ft ash pile...When I bought my homesite in 2005 from Crescent Resources (then a Duke subsidiary) we received no disclosures about the nearby coal ash, either verbally or in writing. It wasn't until we started to get to know our neighbors and asked what the growing hill down the road was that we found out about the coal ash...and the black streaks on the exteriors of our house, coal ash...Heavy equipment noise being heard all night, coal ash...

I went to the Jan 17<sup>th</sup> meeting in Sherrills Ford. A poorly run meeting. There was no way all those people could get to the various tables and try to get answers. Two tables I went to for information passed me off to other tables because they didn't have answers for me. Most of the answers the DEQ staff gave to the crowd involved "we'll have to look into that", "we're researching that" or "we have to follow the law on that" A law that Duke Energy had considerable input in.

When Senator Sawyer mentioned there is no Evil Empire here keeping things from getting done, but that bureaucracy was the problem. That's not entirely true. Duke Energy has lied to the public before and is not very transparent with what it does. For example:

- Last year, Duke fenced off the area along Island Point Rd. There's speculation that's it's to add more ash piles, but there's no information available.

- Last year Duke cleared out large areas along the power lines between Island Point Rd and Molly's Backbone Rd. There's speculation that it's for the natural gas line that will come from Virginia to feed Marshall Steam Plant, which is rumored to begin a hybrid of coal and gas usage in the next year or two.

- Last year Duke cleared a massive area on Molly's Backbone Rd. which used to be hunting grounds and had been originally approved for homes. There's speculation now that it will be a solar farm.

When these type of things happen in your community and no one will give you answers, you become suspicious.

I went to the coal ash meetings Duke held a couple of years ago and heard basically the same answers at every meeting; "we'll have to look into that", "we're researching that" or "we're following EPA regulations".

Something needs to be done and it needs to be started soon. The sooner it's started, the sooner it will be finished. Yes it's gonna cost a lot of money, but ya know, we've bailed out the auto companies, the savings and loan companies, Wall Street investors and energy companies before. Why can't the people of NC be bailed out on this one??

Lake Norman is not just used for drinking water, but people swim in it, fish from it, use it

to irrigate their yards that their kids play on and the state is allowing Duke Energy to pollute it. Duke plans to put a recreation area (swimming, boating and camping) next to the ash piles on Island Point Rd. If the people of Charlotte understood the ramifications of the pollution from Marshall Steam plant and their water, there would be millions of voices being heard.

There is only one solution to this issue, excavate the ash above the water table and away from the lake and homes. We don't need another Dan River or Tennessee Valley Authority disaster here.

The most chilling thing I've read came from a Duke spokesman after the DEQ meeting in Greenboro...At the Belews Creek plant, both Duke Energy's preferred hybrid concept and the landfill approach favored by environmentalists would drain the 270-acre ash basin and treat the water it holds before releasing it to the Dan River nearby.

Both plans also include treating ground water elsewhere on the plant property with the goal of cleaning it up to North Carolina's basic "2L" standard for cleanliness and safety near the current ash basin.

Duke Energy consultants said in a report recently released by DEQ that goal will take a long time to achieve whether regulators choose closure by the landfill disposal favored by environmentalists or by the hybrid method that the utility prefers.

Either way, they said, "the time to achieve compliance with the 2L standard at the compliance boundary is approximately 100 to 200 years."

We're really going to make generations wait for clean water??

I moved to North Carolina in 2014 from Tennessee, where I witnessed the immediate aftermath of the largest coal ash disaster in the United States in late 2008. As a researcher, I spent a lot of time speaking with residents and workers impacted by the Tennessee Valley Authority spill. Had the disaster occurred during the day time, it could have been deadly for residents and the agency had opportunities to prevent the disaster prior to the spill by moving the ash to a lined, dry landfill, but the agency chose the cheapest route to address previous problems in the impoundment. In the long-run, the disaster cost much more than it would have cost to convert the impoundment to a lined landfill. The costs were not just felt by TVA, but by the community, especially those who were displaced, those who experienced devalued property, and those who fear the long-term health outcomes. DEQ and Duke Energy have the opportunity to make the right decision for everyone and to prevent future disasters, spills and leaks. **DEQ should require Duke Energy to remove its coal ash from its leaking, unlined impoundments and move it to dry lined storage.** This is what the community wants and it is the best choice for people, the environment, and water systems.

Although I am now merely a private citizen concerned about coal ash storage, as a previous staff member at Clean Water for North Carolina, I spent many years researching coal ash contamination. I know the threats that unlined ash basins can pose to public health and environmental quality, even when the water is drained and the basin is capped in place. I urge you not to allow capping in place of ash at this or any other site in North Carolina.

One aspect that concerns me is that the toxic metals and other compounds associated with coal ash would still be present without any liner after the basin is drained, and could therefore still leach into the nearby aquifer, affecting well water and surface water nearby. Please consider conducting your own independent analysis that identifies the safest closure option for the long-term protection of water supplies. 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Dear DEQ,

I am writing my letter to you as a tax paying citizen, a mother to two small children, a wife, a friend, and person with heavy community involvement and interest as I have properties here in Mooresville and most importantly, my family lives and is established here. I live on Lake Norman, at the end of Brawley School Road.

The coal ash meeting which occurred in January at Sherrill's Ford Elementary left me feeling flabbergasted and baffled.

The DEQ was not prepared for the public even though they knew the publicity surrounding the coal ash placement issue. They selected a small venue, and left many public members standing outside of the elementary school gym, unable to enter. They spoke for less than 3 minutes, pointed to some pictures and told us to leave. While the public didn't leave, the meeting left me shocked. If I came to a meeting at my job, as unprepared as they did to help answer questions surrounding ground water contamination, pollutants, laws surrounding coal ash placement, how other states are managing removing coal ash from their environment or even other counties in NC removing it... if I came this unprepared, I would be terminated from my position. That meeting was nothing short of absurd and shocking, truly. Why were the people representing the DEQ there so aloof and unprepared to discuss the topic at hand?

So many questions left unanswered by the public, so many worries still there and the worries were fed by lack of preparedness, lack of listening, or just overall aloofness towards a highly sensitive issue.

Getting down to vocalizing my stance... removing the coal ash is a must, there is no other option. And it needs to be moved away from here, starting now. Our communities have suffered enough with fear, cancer worries, multiple studies, crashing property values, and a cancer cluster. The time frame of 2029 provided by Duke is nothing short of silly. They want you to think moving coal ash is expensive, unobtainable, give you lengthy time lines... they are baiting you. They can do anything they want they think here in Mooresville and surrounding communities, right? They think they can threaten costs and road costs and more, but when they built that coal ash unlined pond and dumped the waste in there and profited off of you and me by polluting our air, our soil, our homes, and our lake, did they provide you with the dividends of their profits? When the air from the steam plant rolls out of those pipes, and it contains mercury, radiation, thallium, arsenic and more, did they cut you a check when they were burning that coal to make a profit? What will we let them continue to get away with to make a profit? And how long will the consequences of the choices for the community bear effect? It is hurtful to think, that we as people bear no substance against a profit making machine. That we cannot protect ourselves and our children with our education, public stance at a public meeting, community forums, and common sense that toxicity in water or soil or air surrounding us will cause negative consequences and that our education and voice of the community as tax payers and citizens is not enough. But having endless funds to look away might be? And that if Duke pushes their agenda a little harder, what can they get away with? What are you going to allow them to do to us?

Additionally, the current stipulations surrounding how Duke is the only power plant in the nation, particularly in NC, not to have the same environmental protection guidance that other organizations has, has me concerned. How did this occur? How was this allowed? Who supported these initiatives?

According to the Environment Attorney's at the meeting, my friends, my neighbors, and other avenues of council, it is illegal for Duke Energy to assume a cap in place. They would be getting away with.. well, dumping unlined toxic sludge in our environment. Allowing our children to clean up after them or our children's children.... but why can you not face them today? Tell them like Cape Fear ... tell them to change... or get rid of them. Just like they seize people's property, you are the government. Tell them to ship up and get their toxic sludge out.

Help me. Help me enjoy living here. Help us live a better life, cleaner air, cleaner soil & cleaner water and support us on removing the coal ash, as soon as possible, before the toxicity of the coal ash pond reaches my home and my children, my children's school, and my friends, if it hasn't already.

I asked my husband to read my letter. He just laughed at me and said, "It is the same old same old. No one is going to listen to you." How very sad, not just for me, but for our community and my family.

Excavation would cause only a 4% increase in daily truck traffic on community roads compared to a 7% increase for the duration of the cap-in-place scenario.

Writing as a concerned citizen who also serves as an elected official (in my third term as a Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisor in Mecklenburg, after having served 6 terms on the Charlotte City Council, i.e. 12 years), I do want to voice my anxiety about coal ash. The professional opinion is that sites containing coal ash should not be capped where they are, since groundwater is invaded by the toxins from these sites which would require maintenance and monitoring and would ultimately end up in our surface waters through seepage or breaches. I am particularly concerned about the site at Mountain Island which provides drinking water for most of our region.

Professionals recommend that coal ash be stored in lined landfills which meet federal guidelines. I am concerned about leaching from concrete if the coal ash is mixed into any building materials. Has there been sufficient, long term research done on that solution?

I am also concerned that Duke Energy not pass along to consumers the cost of any approved solution. Shareholders, including our family, benefitted from the savings of the unprotected deposits. I think that the shareholders should shoulder the responsibility for rectifying the situation.

My points I am trying to make today are:

1. The coal ash produced by the Marshall Steam plant AND the Allen plant **needs to be excavated and properly contained**—either through recycling measures or put into properly created and lined storage fields. The reasons to support this decision are mainly environmental. The CRB is our LIMITED water resource for this area of the state and if Duke Power is allowed to pollute it by letting coal ash leach into the CRB, then shame on you DENR!! How many millions of people use this water resource daily? Isn't that enough reason to require Duke to properly contain this hazardous by-product?

As a former environmental scientist for the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, I am compelled to provide my observation: Duke has not provided reasonable assurance that the Marshall and Allen coal ash ponds will be in compliance with federal and state environmental laws.

To be clear, it is impossible for anyone to provide any reasonable assurance that a hazardous waste storage site will be in compliance when: (1) the site is already out of compliance and (2) cannot be corrected without the complete excavation, installation of proper lining, and construction of containment infrastructure. We know that coal ash and derivative contaminants AR in the groundwater table at both the Marshall Steam Station and the Allen Steam Station. Duke has stipulated to those facts, as well.

Consider that if the coal ash is excavated, in order to construct an appropriately lined storage reservoir, a new permit application (not modification) would normally be required and fair and equal standards applied. As part of that application, the riverside and lakeside locations would probably not be selected for a new facility under today's siting rules.

Indeed, it appears that Duke has been given preferential treatment, evidenced by the arbitrary procedural measures taken to reclassify its ash ponds as reduced risk. The risk reduction was not granted because of changed physical conditions on-site. Rather, the risk was reduced simply because Duke asked for a favorable reassessment. A different standard was applied. Reviewers appear to have tailored their assessment in order to reclassify the sites because the potential risk of the sites has only increased due to the increased amount of material and aging of the facilities. This counterintuitive risk assessment and decision-making process satisfies the (normally difficult to illustrate) "arbitrary and capricious" standard required to revoke a permit.

I also expect that other facilities have not been granted the option to cap hazardous waste in-place when it was actively contaminating groundwater, wetlands, and surface waters-- particularly drinking water supplies. Although no site is equal, North Carolina residents and businesses require an equal application of the law. The mere fact that a cap-in-place option was extended to Duke illustrates unfair and improper application of administrative rules and procedures.

From a permitting or compliance administrator's perspective, it will be a nightmare address ongoing, chronic violations at these sites as hydrological and geological processes continue. Leaving the waste at these locations indefinitely requires an unacceptable amounts of government hand holding and babysitting. I don't think the State of North Carolina is prepared to assume the role of adoptive parents of two problem children.

For decades, Duke has abdicated its responsibility to better dispose of and recycle its coal ash. It is time that Duke assumes the responsibility.

It is also time that NCDEQ stops deferring to Duke. NCDEQ has the staff and the expertise. So, deference to information provided by Duke contractors at public meetings is an insult to the talented scientists, engineers, and technicians working for the state of North Carolina.

North Carolina's coal ash dumps and ponds must to be cleaned up and DEQ should only allow complete encapsulation for the new ash storage facilities. The existing dumps should be carefully excavated to minimize airborne particulates and moved away from rivers and flood plains to fully lined sites on Duke Energy's property.

Cap-in-place is unacceptable for **any** of the coal ash sites in North Carolina. Any "solutions" proposed by Duke Energy that do not excavate and move ash to fully lined, scientifically designed systems that fully encapsulate coal ash must be rejected. Without multiple, sealed bottom, side, and top liners, North Carolina's groundwater will always be at risk. Due to increases in extreme weather, more frequent hurricanes and massive rainstorms, groundwater models of 100 or 500-year floodplain are obsolete. Given the unpredictable fluctuations in the water tables and groundwater flows, there is no way that surface capping without properly engineered underlying bottom liners can protect groundwater in the coming decades.

Unlike Duke Energy's new lined landfill at Brickhaven in Chatham County, the construction of all new lined landfills should be scientifically engineered to protect groundwater in every way possible. Duke Energy's has a long history of widespread groundwater and surface water contamination, and criminal violations of the clean water act. Because of these repeated and gross violations that created health problems and drinking water contamination throughout the state, DEQ should require Duke Energy's new landfills to go beyond the minimal mandatory protections provided by current regulations. DEQ must carry out independent studies and obtain recommendations for the best liner technologies, redundant liners, and with multiple long-term safeguards. Scientifically based placements for baseline and ongoing groundwater monitoring wells should be established. These must be thoroughly and constantly monitored – with full, public, transparent, internet accessible, easily available data from the monitoring results.

Ground water and surface monitoring should be ongoing for a minimum of 50 years. This monitoring should be funded by Duke Energy, but carried out by independent, qualified field technicians and laboratories.

During excavation, construction, and filling of the landfills, all worker safety measures should be taken to prevent a repeat of the serious harms to worker health from the cleanup crews that worked on the TVA spill in Kingston, Tennessee. Again, unlike Brickhaven, worker safety, proper fitting and testing of N95, or better, particulate masks should be required for everyone that works in or around the coal ash, or that operates bulldozers, dump trucks, or heavy equipment that transport the ash. Wherever needed, full protective suits should be provided to workers. Regularly scheduled OSHA inspections, as well as unannounced and unscheduled OSHA inspections should be part of the clean-up and construction permits until all exposed ash is fully covered at each site.

While transporting existing coal ash dumps away from rivers and floodplains is essential, every effort should be taken by DEQ to ensure that the distances coal ash is moved is minimized and that the coal ash destinations are always kept on Duke Energy's property.

Once constructed, these new lined landfills should represent the best technologies and materials available – not materials that create short-term financial savings. The original existing dumps were disasters for public health, for NC communities, and for our state's waters. We have this one chance to remediate some of the damages and most importantly, to safeguard future generations from heavy metal coal ash contamination. Our state-wide re-design of storage systems for millions of tons of coal ash must be done right this time.

No coal ash sites, no coal ash communities should be considered low-risk, and all deserve full protection. Gross environmental justice violations have been committed by the past handling of coal ash placements and coal ash processing practices. Now, DEQ must protect all communities. The NC Department of Environmental Quality must ensure that none of these communities, which have experienced many decades of harm, are given less than full protections. No cap-in-place permits should be allowed.

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We learned yesterday that – as soon as the Feb. 15 comment deadline for the closure options evaluations had passed -- Duke Energy submitted an additional report that purports to estimate greenhouse gas emissions associated with the various closure options for its six unresolved coal ash sites in North Carolina.

We will submit a detailed response to this report shortly.

However, NCDEQ should disregard this submission because it was made after the department's deadline for Duke to submit its materials and outside the public comment period, denying the public an opportunity to respond to it. NCDEQ should also disregard this submission because it is irrelevant to the decision facing NCDEQ, which is to select a closure method that stops the ongoing pollution and continuing threat to our water resources posed by Duke Energy's leaking coal ash basins. Duke Energy operates coal-burning generating units at each of these facilities that emit huge amounts of greenhouse gases, and NCDEQ would lose all credibility if it allowed Duke Energy to leave the toxic residuals from burning coal in leaking pits forever because of Duke Energy's supposed concern for greenhouse gas emissions.

Nor should NCDEQ and the Cooper Administration delay their decision as a result of Duke Energy's gamesmanship. NCDEQ already knows that Duke Energy's cap in place and hybrid closure plans would leave millions of tons of coal ash saturated in groundwater, where they will continue to leach toxic pollutants into public waters for decades to come, and where they will continue to pose a risk of catastrophic failure. And it knows that tens of thousands of North Carolinians have called on the agency to protect our waters by removing the ash from the unlined lagoons and placing it into dry, lined storage or recycling for concrete, as is being done in South Carolina and Virginia. It is time to require Duke Energy to remove its coal ash from the unlined basins at these six sites.

I am a concerned citizen who has lived in Mooresville, NC for just under 4 years. My family moved to this

area from the midwest for what we thought would be a better quality of life. In the brief time that I've lived here, I have come to learn about the dangerous coal ash we are being exposed to very close to our homes.

In the past 2 years, people all over our community, including friends and neighbors, have been diagnosed with thyroid and other cancers, as well as autoimmune diseases. The teenage daughter of a dear friend of mine was diagnosed with thyroid cancer - and there have been many others in our community with the same diagnosis (including young children and teens).

Unfortunately, I am now one of the people dealing with thyroid disease. Last year, an ultrasound found 2 large nodules on my thyroid - which thankfully were benign, but I have since found out that I have Graves Disease and severe hyperthyroidism which has greatly impacted my quality of life. I have 2 young daughters, 14 and 11, and their wellbeing is my top priority. My oldest daughter is a freshman at Lake Norman High school - which sits close to Marshall Steam Station and next to land that has confirmed exposed coal ash. This is **TOTALLY UNACCEPTABLE** - and it is up to those of you responsible for environmental quality in our state to ensure our kids are safe while attending school. There should be testing of soil and air to confirm our kids are safe - and they should not have to attend school so close to unlined coal ash pits!

The rates of thyroid cancer and illness in our community are **NOT NORMAL** and it is up to the Department of Environmental Quality to find out if there is something in our environment making us sick.

**One of the first things that should be done is to force Duke Energy to CLEAN UP Marshall Steam Station and remove the dangerous coal ash that is polluting our area. I believe the best option is to haul the coal ash away — and I still don't understand why that is not an option. At the VERY LEAST, there should be COMPLETE EXCAVATION with liners to prevent further pollution.**

It is our duty as parents to protect our children, and it is your duty as our state Environmental Quality department to make sure we are safe in our community.

I urge you to hold Duke Energy accountable and clean up their mess to ensure we are all safe!
