# Other (Federal) Wetlands and Streams – Clean Water Act Section 404 Permit

**What Activities Require This Permit**? You must obtain a Clean Water Act Section 404 Permit if you intend to discharge dredged or fill material into the waters of the United States, including special aquatic sites such as wetlands. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) can authorize activities by a Standard Individual Permit, Nationwide Permit, Regional General Permit or Letter of Permission. It will be up to the ACE to make the determination on what type of authorization is needed.

**What Is The Purpose of This Permit?** The purpose of the Section 404 permit is to protect the aquatic environment, while ensuring regulatory program efficiency and ensure fair, reasonable and timely decisions are made about activities that would result in a discharge of dredge or fill material into waters of the United States, including special aquatic sites such as wetlands.

**Who Issues This Permit?** The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Wilmington District Regulatory Division reviews applications for Section 404 Permits. **How Much Will This Permit Cost?** Most permits issued by the ACE such as Letters of Permission, Nationwide and General Permits do not have a permit fee. Individual Permits have fees of \$10 for individuals and \$100 for businesses, to be paid once the permit has been issued and accepted by the applicant.

**How Long Will It Take To Review My Application?** Approximately 45 calendar days for Nationwide Permits (upon receipt of a correct and complete application package). The target processing time for Standard Individual Permits is 120 days upon receipt of a complete permit application, but may be longer depending on the nature and complexity of the permit request.

Applicants requiring an Environmental Impact Statement (i.e., less than 1% of applicants) average about three years to make a permit decision.

# How Long Is My Permit Valid?

- Regional Permit: Expiration date is generally 5 years after the Effective Date of the issuance of the Regional General permit. The majority of Regional General permits were issued in January 2017 and would expire at the end of 2021. Once the permits expire, they are generally renewed for another 5 years after a re-evaluation period.
- Standard Individual Permit: Expiration dates will vary depending on the nature and complexity of the project, however an individual permit will typically expire in 3-10 years.
- Letter of Permission: 3 years.
- Nationwide Permit: Expiration date is generally 5 years after the Effective Date of the issuance of the Nationwide permit. Most recent Nationwide permits were issued in March 2017, and the permits will expire in 2022. Once the permits expire, they are generally renewed for another 5 years after a re-evaluation period.

**Legal Authority/Statute Reference:** The Federal Water Pollution Control Act, more commonly known as the "Clean Water Act," under Section 404, directs the Secretary of the Army, acting through the Chief of Engineers, to issue permits, after notice and opportunity for public hearings, for the discharge of dredged or fill material into waters of the United States at specified disposal sites.
