WATER QUALITY REGIONAL OPERATIONS SECTION

The WQROS has regulatory authority to ensure both groundwater and surface water quality are protected from adverse impacts resulting from various types of wastewater collection and disposal practices through comprehensive permitting, inspection, and enforcement activities. Other programmatic areas are regulating groundwater well development, wetland protection and restoration, watershed protection, technical assistance to permit holders, ambient water quality monitoring, participation in scientific studies and investigating all types of reported citizen concerns.

PUBLIC WATER SUPPLY SECTION

The PWSS regulates public water systems within the State. Public water systems are those which provide piped drinking water to at least 15 connections or 25 or more people for 60 or more days/yr. The PWSS works to ensure that water from these public water systems is safe to drink. This is accomplished through inspections, source site approval, investigations, plans and specification reviews, operating report reviews, providing emergency response to water systems, and by providing technical assistance to water system personnel, consultants, and operators.

DIVISION OF WASTE MANAGEMENT BROWNFIELDS PROGRAM

The North Carolina Brownfields Program, authorized by the State statute known as the Brownfields Property Reuse Act, provides a mechanism to treat prospective developers of brownfield sites differently than the parties responsible for contaminating them. Prospective developers negotiate a brownfields agreement with the program that defines activities needed to make the site suitable for reuse, rather than cleaning up the site to regulatory standards (which responsible parties are required to do).
