DRY-CLEANING SOLVENT CLEANUP ACT ANNUAL REPORT

<u>Executive Summary</u>

As required by the Dry-Cleaning Solvent Cleanup Act (DSCA) of 1997 and amendments (G.S. 143-215.104A *et seq.*), this report provides an annual update on activities conducted in the DSCA Program in 2005. The DSCA of 1997 and its amendments created a fund for assessment and cleanup of dry-cleaning solvent environmental contamination at dry-cleaning and wholesale distribution facilities.

Significant progress has been made in all aspects of program implementation. Areas of program development showing the most progress are risk-based rule development, Assessment and Remediation Agreements, work authorizations, prioritization and comprehensive assessments, priority ranking, contracting, imminent hazard abatement and emergency response, assessment guidance and database development, operating facility compliance with minimum management practices and outreach.

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) has identified 196 operating or abandoned dry-cleaning facilities with environmental contamination by dry-cleaning solvent. Of these, 128 have voluntarily petitioned for acceptance, and 119 have been certified into the DSCA Program. Assessment and Remediation Agreements have been executed for 66 sites and 56 sites have been prioritized.

The majority of claims against the Fund to date have been for "past costs." The DSCA Program is authorized to reimburse petitioners for reasonable, necessary and documented costs incurred between October 1997 and June 2001 in certain situations. Petitioners have submitted past cost reimbursement claims for 13 sites totaling \$2,612,290. Of that total, \$1,517,518 has been approved for reimbursement. A total of \$1,090,815 was paid to petitioners in FY 2004-05.

With the infusion of the sales tax monies, which began in July 2003, DSCA now appears to have sufficient financial resources to assess and clean up the contaminated dry-cleaning facilities identified to date by DENR. New discoveries will continue to be reported, largely due to property transactions. However, with 27 new sites reported in 2005, if the rate of discovery remains steady, the addition of new sites to the program should not overwhelm the DSCA Fund.

The program is currently developing risk-based rules as required by DSCA for the assessment and cleanup of contaminated dry-cleaning sites. A contractor who specializes in the development of risk-based programs for state regulatory agencies was hired in 2005 to assist in the rulemaking process. It is anticipated that these rules will be completed by December 2006.

Fund expenditures for site work will increase significantly when additional contracts with environmental engineering firms are executed and the risk-based rules are completed. Expenditures are projected to increase by approximately 230 percent beginning in FY 2006-07.

Program Status

DENR has made significant progress in implementing DSCA. DENR has solicited input from members of the DSCA Stakeholders Working Group (DSCA Stakeholders) and other interested parties to develop new policies and procedures. Participants in the DSCA Stakeholders include the following:

- DENR representatives and Department of Justice attorneys assigned to DENR,
- Dry cleaners from leadership of the North Carolina Association of Launderers and Cleaners,
- Environmental consultants,
- Representatives from environmental advocacy organizations,
- Dry cleaners using alternative dry-cleaning technologies,
- North Carolina State University's School of Textiles faculty, and
- Private attorneys representing dry cleaners and shopping centers.

A summary of DSCA Program site status is provided in Table 1.

Program Development

The primary objective of DSCA in 2005 was to continue working toward full implementation of the program. To attain this goal, DSCA staff directed significant energy towards the development of supporting policies, procedures, and guidance. To reduce resource consumption and optimize customer service, DSCA uses its web site (www.ncdsca.org) and e-mail as the primary means to deliver program documents to its customers. As in the previous year, DSCA staff continued reviewing petitions, determining site eligibility, executing assessment and remediation agreements, screening sites for imminent hazards, supply well sampling and prioritizing sites. New activities performed in 2005 include comprehensive site assessments to delineate extent of contamination, groundwater monitoring and providing users of impacted water supply wells with clean water.

Specifically, progress was achieved in the following areas:

- Risk-Based Rule Development
- Past-Cost Reimbursement
- State-Lead Contracts
- Assessment and Remediation Agreement
- Prioritization Assessments
- Prioritization of Sites

- Database Application
- Facility Compliance and Outreach

Risk-Based Rule Development

DENR has been delegated the task of developing rules that establish a risk-based approach to assessing, prioritizing, and cleaning up dry-cleaning solvent contamination that resulted from releases at certified facilities or abandoned sites. During the past year, the DSCA Program hired an independent contractor, the RAM Group of Houston, Texas, a firm that specializes in helping states develop risk-based rules and implementation guidance. The RAM Group is currently developing a draft document with risk procedures as well as standardized reporting forms and customized spreadsheets that perform the risk calculations necessary to determine site-specific, risk-based cleanup levels. Once the draft risk document is completed, review and discussion of its content will be performed within DENR and input will be sought from a review group composed of DSCA Stakeholders. Draft rules will then be developed and advanced through the rulemaking process. It is anticipated that these rules will be completed by December 2006.

Past-Cost Reimbursement

The majority of claims against the Fund to date have been for "past costs." The DSCA Program is authorized to reimburse petitioners for appropriately documented and reasonably necessary costs incurred between October 1997 and June 2001 in certain situations pursuant to Section 2.(a) of House Bill 1062 (Session Law 2001-265). Petitioners have submitted past cost reimbursement claims for 13 sites totaling \$2,612,290.79. After reviewing the claims to determine eligible costs and subtracting the required \$50,000 deductible for each site, the DSCA Program determined that a total of \$1,517,518.21 could be reimbursed to petitioners for 10 of the 13 sites.

Previously, the DSCA Program could only reimburse up to 10 percent of the previous fiscal year's revenue credited toward the Fund. In FY 2002-03, \$1.08 million was credited toward the Fund. Pursuant to House Bill 1062, the total amount that could be reimbursed during FY 2003-04 was \$108,000 (ten percent of the previous year's revenue). This amount was reimbursed to the highest prioritized site in May 2004.

On July 1, 2004, Senate Bill 1219 was signed into law by Governor Easley. This bill increased the percentage that could be used for past cost claims from 10 percent to 25 percent. This bill also allowed the DSCA Program to reimburse up to \$200,000 per site during FY 2004-05 for all eligible costs from past cost claims. Eligible costs above \$200,000 per site will be reimbursed during FY 2005-06 (\$260,410.97) and FY 2006-07 (\$58,689.75). During FY 2004-05, the DSCA Program reimbursed a total of \$1,090,815.49 to petitioners.

State-Lead Contracts

In July 2004, DENR executed contracts with four environmental engineering firms to perform state-lead assessment and remediation at DSCA sites. The contracts total \$2.4 million with a term of three years. During FY 04-05, these contractors have performed prioritization

assessments, comprehensive assessments and imminent hazard response activities, including the removal of contaminated soil and provision of clean drinking water to residences with contaminated water supply wells. In June 2005, the State Building Commission awarded three additional contracts totaling \$9 million to three environmental engineering firms. The DSCA Program anticipates these contracts will be executed in October 2005.

Assessment and Remediation Agreement

An Assessment and Remediation Agreement (ARA) that is executed by the DSCA Program and petitioners for certified sites was developed for use beginning in September 2004. This agreement encompasses all phases of site work (prioritization and comprehensive assessments and remedial action) and allows DSCA to direct all work using its state-lead contractors. Petitioners must sign this agreement in order to obtain the liability protection afforded by DSCA and to allow DSCA's contractors to assess and remediate certified sites. Sixty-six ARAs have been executed to date. Prior to September 2004, Prioritization Assessment Agreements (PAAs) between DSCA and petitioners were used to prioritize sites. However, the PAA has been phased out and all future work will be performed under the ARA.

Prioritization Assessments

Unless site assessment information obtained during an earlier pre-DSCA investigation is available, a prioritization assessment must be performed at DSCA sites following certification into the program. Work performed during this phase consists of limited soil and groundwater sampling to determine the severity of contamination. This sampling is conducted in conjunction with a survey of the area surrounding the site to locate all potential receptors (public and private drinking water wells, surface water bodies, sensitive ecological environments) that may be threatened by the contamination.

DSCA project managers instruct the program's state-lead contractors to submit work plans that follow procedures outlined in a prioritization assessment guidance document that details the necessary scope for this work phase. Following authorization by the DSCA Program, the contractor performs the assessment and submits a prioritization assessment report that enables the program to determine the priority ranking of the site. Pursuant to the requirements of the DSCA statute, money from the fund must be obligated to higher priority sites first.

Following completion of the prioritization assessment and receipt of the contractor's invoice, the DSCA project manager would prepare and mail an invoice to the site's petitioner(s) for an amount up to the site's applicable deductible. Once the deductible has been met, the DSCA fund covers all costs until total site costs reach \$200,000, at which point the petitioner(s) become responsible for one to three percent of incurred costs.

Prioritization of Sites

A total of 56 sites have been prioritized to date. In October 2004 the DSCA Program implemented a new priority scoring system that was based on the threat of contamination to nearby receptors such as supply wells and surface water. The new scoring system assigns a score that corresponds to the specific receptor that is being threatened. For example, a score of

"1.2" indicates that "an active domestic drinking water supply well is impacted or immediately threatened by the release and that the user has no access to another public or private water supply." DSCA staff can immediately know what actual or potential hazard exists at a site based simply on its score. If multiple sites are assigned the same score, then DSCA staff can evaluate other factors such as magnitude of contamination in determining priority order. All 56 prioritized sites have been re-evaluated using the new prioritization system and the sites have been ordered in terms of priority.

Database and Geographic Information System (GIS) Application

The DSCA Program has invested significant time and effort to develop and refine its database and GIS applications. Rapid application development techniques have been used to ensure its ability to manage data is flexible and can grow with the program. Technical and financial information has been entered into the database. The programmatic tracking and reporting applications are frequently revised to respond to changing information management needs.

Major improvements in 2005 focused on refining the database so that it could track project financial details. Reporting capabilities include project status, current site actions, site deductibles, costs applied toward the deductible, past-cost reimbursements, invoices, payments, work authorized on a per cost basis and change orders.

In July 2005 DENR purchased GIS software that the DSCA Program will use to view site information utilizing digital mapping. This technology will enhance project managers' ability to quickly evaluate site conditions regarding contamination, thereby assisting in site assessment and remediation.

Facility Compliance and Outreach

DENR has been authorized under DSCA to develop rules that operating dry-cleaning facilities must follow to prevent environmental contamination by dry-cleaning solvents. These rules, or Minimum Management Practices (MMPs), were implemented in 2001 as temporary rules and were approved as permanent rules in 2002. In 2005 the DSCA Program created and filled a new position that will coordinate compliance assistance visits and formal inspections of facilities and also serve as the lead for enforcement actions where necessary. This individual is currently developing inspection checklists, guidance documents and a facility database. Two additional positions are being created for inspectors who will be assigned to perform compliance assistance and facility inspections throughout the state. It is anticipated that both of these positions will be filled in FY 2005-06.

The DSCA Program is currently working to develop a memorandum-of-agreement with the Division of Air Quality that would enable the program to perform compliance inspections for air quality regulations that are applicable to dry-cleaning facilities. The program is also planning to inspect facilities for compliance with Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) regulations, which currently are administered by the Division of Waste Management's Hazardous Waste Section. Such multimedia inspections will enable one program within DENR to ensure compliance with all environmental regulatory requirements and will give dry cleaners and the public a single DENR point-of-contact for compliance questions or concerns.

From September 2004 through May 2005, Mr. YongJim served as an intern to the DSCA Program to improve educational outreach to the Korean dry cleaners in the state. Mr. Kim was a graduate student in Duke University's International Development Policy Program who had worked for the past 20 years with the Korean Ministry of Environment. Mr. Kim met with Korean dry cleaner associations and gave a presentation on the DSCA cleanup and compliance programs to Korean dry cleaners at a training conference in Kernersville, North Carolina. Mr. Kim also translated into Korean the 2005 Dry Cleaners Air and Waste Compliance Calendar prepared by the North Carolina Small Business Assistance Program.

The DSCA Program has continued its association with dry-cleaning programs in other states through its participation in the State Coalition for the Remediation of Drycleaners (SCRD). This work group is sponsored by the EPA's Technology Innovation Office. DSCA has benefited greatly from this organization by learning from the experiences of other states. In May 2005 the North Carolina DSCA Program served as the host for SCRD's annual meeting in Raleigh.

Annual Report Elements Required by G.S. 143-215.104U

(1) DRY-CLEANING SOLVENT CONTAMINATION REPORTED TO THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES

DSCA maintains files and a database inventory of 196 sites that are contaminated by drycleaning solvent. This number represents all dry-cleaning solvent releases known to DENR, assuming other agencies have forwarded notices of release to DSCA. However, it has been estimated that over 900 contaminated current or former dry-cleaning sites exist in North Carolina. Table 2 provides a list, by county, of all known sites contaminated with dry cleaning solvent. A total of 27 new dry-cleaning solvent releases were reported to DSCA in 2005. Many of these contaminated sites were identified as a result of real estate transactions and redevelopment projects.

(2) SITES CERTIFIED BY THE COMMISSION

DSCA must review a petition and the site file to determine if the site and the petitioner meet the statutory criteria for certification into the Program. Of the 128 sites that have petitioned for Program entry, 119 have been certified into the Program. Two sites have been denied certification due to failure to meet the requirements for certification as mandated by DSCA. The seven remaining sites that have not yet been certified are newly received petitions that are currently under review. The certified sites are shown in Table 3 along with current site status.

Data from these petitions have been compiled to evaluate general site characteristics. A summary is presented in Table 4. The majority of the petitioners are property owners (108), as opposed to drycleaner business owners/operators (61). Of the sites that applied, 58 percent are abandoned sites.

(3) COST ESTIMATE FOR ASSESSMENT AND REMEDIATION OF CERTIFIED SITES

Actual costs to assess and remediate DSCA sites are anticipated to vary widely from site to site. Factors influencing costs include site geology, age of release, the chemical nature of the solvents released and the threats posed to potential receptors. However, an annual spending cap of \$200,000 per site is applied by statute unless contamination at a site poses an imminent threat to public health. In these cases, annual expenditures are capped at \$400,000 per site.

Based on costs figures provided by other states, DSCA can calculate an approximate total cleanup cost for those sites that have been certified into the program. Using an average total cleanup cost of \$250,000 per site, the total projected cost to remediate the 119 presently certified sites is approximately \$30 million. Based on figures from the North Carolina Department of Labor, there are at least 2,000 active and abandoned dry-cleaning facilities in the state. Investigations performed across the nation indicate that contamination is present in about 75 percent of all dry-cleaning operations. Applying this percentage to the number of current and former facilities in North Carolina, a total of 1,500 contaminated sites may be present. If only 50 percent of these contaminated sites are accepted into the DSCA Program, the projected total cleanup cost would be approximately \$188 million.

The DSCA Program controls site costs by reviewing and pre-approving all work plans submitted by its state-lead contractors prior to the start of field activities. All plans are required to provide sufficient detail (e.g., unit costs, subcontractor bids) to allow for an effective pre-approval review. DSCA's contracts include set unit rates that the contractors must follow for all assigned work.

(4) RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS FOR THE FUND

The primary funding sources for the dry-cleaning solvent cleanup fund are a tax on drycleaning solvents and, beginning in July 2003, the state portion of the current sales tax on drycleaning. The DSCA Fund's finances through FY 2004-05 (ending June 30, 2005) are summarized below:

Fund expenditures for site work will increase significantly when additional contracts with environmental engineering firms are executed and the risk-based rules are completed. The DSCA Program up to this time has been assessing the extent of contamination at certified sites and performing remediation to address imminent hazard situations such as treatment and replacement of contaminated drinking water and excavation of hazardous soil. Once developed and implemented, the risk-based rules will enable the Program to determine site-specific cleanup levels at all sites. Remediation, the most expensive phase of site work, can then commence at those sites where the risks posed by the contamination are unacceptable as defined by the rules. Expenditures are projected to increase by approximately 230 percent beginning in FY 2006-07.

(5) CLAIMS AGAINST THE FUND

There are two types of claims against the DSCA Fund. The majority of claims come from petitioners that incurred past investigative/remedial costs in response to an order or notice of violation from DENR prior to DSCA implementation. Past-cost claims that meet the requirements of Section 2.(a) of House Bill 1062 (Session Law 2001-265) were described previously in the section on "Past-Cost Reimbursement". Of those eligible past costs totaling \$1,517,518.21, a total of \$1,198,417.49 has been reimbursed and the remaining \$319,100.72 will be reimbursed in FY 2005-06 and FY 2006-07.

The second type of claim against the DSCA Fund is for approved costs for site work which exceed the site's deductible that was performed by an environmental contractor hired by the petitioner. Beginning in September 2004, the DSCA Program began assigning all site work to its state-lead contractors. However, some claims will be submitted for prioritization assessments conducted by contractors hired by petitioners prior to that time. After subtracting the deductible amount for each of these sites, approximately \$150,000.00 will be reimbursed to these petitioners.

(6) RECOMMENDATIONS TO ASSURE THE SOLVENCY OF THE FUND

DENR has no recommendations regarding fund solvency at this time. Prior to passage of statutory amendments to DSCA in 2000 (S.L. 2000-19), it was clear that the fund balance was inadequate to address all of the dry-cleaning sites in the state. However, with the passage of the DSCA Amendments that established a second funding mechanism, the General Assembly took the most important step necessary to assure future fund solvency. With the infusion of the sales tax monies, which began in July 2003, DSCA now appears to have sufficient financial resources to assess and remediate the contaminated dry-cleaning facilities on a priority basis.

The Fiscal Note on the DSCA Amendments (S.L. 2000-19) anticipated that the funding mechanisms would provide the fund with \$8 million to \$10 million annually. As noted above, total collections for FY 2004-05 were approximately \$9.7 million. Therefore, the DSCA Program is solvent.
