Question # 45 - White Goods and other metals: The town does not have a metals collection program for the public. The only metals collected are those that the staff collects and these are generally odds and ends scrap collected when discovered. White goods are counted under Other Metals and the town does not have a white goods collection program other than what the staff collects and puts in its bin with other metals. This year the City of Clinton did not report any tons of metals. These metals are sent to Sampson Salvage at 718 East Railroad Street, Clinton, NC 28328. (Communication with city staff over the last two years and this year on 10-4-17- DH)

Question # 45- OCC cardboard: Cardboard collected by the city is mostly commercial and is collected as loose cardboard - tonnage reported in "Other" and is sent on to Pratt Industries.(Communication with city staff from last years reporting - DH 8-29-16)

Question # 45 - School Recycling: One 8-yard container is picked up weekly ten months out of the year. It contains commingled single stream and includes cardboard and other items. Unable to provide a tonnage figure from the drop off program (Note from Previous year's Reports - DH)

Question # 48- Household Hazardous Waste Event in 2016-17: The city offers these every other year and this year they held one. (Communication with city staff in August of 2016-DH)

Question 51: Yard Waste Management: The bulk of the materials collected went to the Sampson County Landfill at 7434 Roseboro Highway, Roseboro, NC 28382. The remaining tons went to Terra Blue Incorporated at 484 Hickory Grove Road, Clinton, NC 28328. (Last Year's Note of 2016-DH)

**Scrap Tires: City of Clinton reported that they collected 177 scrap tires from nusiance sites and a total of 123 actual tires that were collected. These were sent to Sampson County. There is a descripancy between Sampson County's reported total of 100 whole tires of various types and the 123 car tires collected by the city and sent to Sampson County (DH Note - 10-3-2017)
