2018 Grant Projects

Siler City Stormwater Infrastructure Mapping and Assessment (\$20,963)

The Triangle J Council of Governments partnered with the Town of Siler City to map the Town's stormwater infrastructure and identify maintenance needs to improve water quality.

Elkin & Jonesville: Stormwater Infrastructure Mapping & Assessment (\$18,826)

The Piedmont Triad Regional Council partnered with the Yadkin Valley Sewer Authority and the Towns of Elkin & Jonesville to inventory and map local stormwater infrastructure and identify maintenance needs to reduce stormwater loads on wastewater facilities.

Upper Middle Creek 9-Element Watershed Action Plan (\$21,847)

The Triangle J Council of Governments worked with Wake County and the Towns of Apex, Holly Springs, Fuquay-Varina, and Cary to create a Watershed Action Plan for the Upper Middle Creek that addresses water quality impairments associated with rapid urbanization.

French Broad River Watershed Stormwater Inventory (\$20,000)

The Land of Sky Regional Council developed detailed, web-based stormwater inventories for the Towns of Laurel Park and Marshall.

Mapping Stormwater Infrastructure in the Town of Bridgeton, NC (\$7,753)

The Eastern Carolina Council partnered with the Town of Bridgeton to map the town's stormwater infrastructure and educate citizens and elected officials on stormwater infrastructure maintenance.

Haskett Creek Watershed Plan (\$18,201)

The Piedmont Triad Regional Council partnered with the North Carolina Division of Water Resources and local stakeholders to develop a 9-Element watershed plan for Haskett Creek in Randolph County, including an analysis of existing water quality data and environmental and land use conditions.

Stormwater Education, Assessments and Planning for the Town of White Lake (\$19,600)

The Lumber River Council of Governments partnered with the Town of White Lake to determine the nature, extent, and cause of stormwater pollution into White Lake as the first step in developing a comprehensive watershed plan.

Carolina Beach Nine Minimum Element Watershed Restoration Plan (\$15,271)

The Cape Fear Council of Governments partnered with the North Carolina Coastal Federation to develop a 9-Element watershed restoration plan for the Town of Carolina Beach.
